## **PC Update Editor's Report** April 2013

I've always liked having a paper diary. There's a comfortable familiarity in seeing a one week spread in front of me and being able to scribble in it by hand. Info Select took care (in a rather clunky manner) of birthday and anniversary reminders year after year, but I've always had the diary to take around with me, with A5 being the perfect size to throw in my bag.

A few months ago I found myself using Google Calendar more and more, until I realised that I wasn't actually writing things in my diary. I think the tipping point was when I purchased my iPad Mini, which is similar in size to my paper diary and can therefore show a week to a page quite nicely (unlike my phone).

Suddenly I felt comfortable making entries directly into the calendar and could navigate around easily, not just by week, but also by day, month or even just each entered event in a concatenated list.

A major feature of Google Calendar is being able to synchronise across different devices. My desktop computer, laptop, iPad Mini and iPhone are all up-to-date via "the cloud". Entries can then be made on whichever one is closest to hand. I'm not tied to one device, or even having an internet connection – I can check my schedule and make updates which are saved and synchronised with my other devices when internet connection returns.

A function I've been increasingly using is separating entries into different calendars. For example, I can turn off everything except the work calendar to check my deadlines, then turn on the children's calendar to see how they fit in with school holidays. There are also calendars available for free download, such as Australian public holidays. You can also



co-ordinate activities with others by sharing calendars. Sharing one with my parents has helped streamline the process of sorting out school drop-offs, holidays and so on.

I still like to see my schedule on paper and print out a month's view to stick on the fridge, but I have not purchased an actual paper diary this year.

Are you on Facebook? What about Twitter? Google+, LinkedIn,YouTube, flickr, tumblr, Pinterest, Foursquare or Instagram?

In the next issue of *PC Update* we'll look at how social networking has changed the way most of us spend our time online. People continue to spend more time on social networks than on any other category of sites – 20 per cent of their time spent on PCs and 30 per cent of their mobile time (http://www.nielsen.com/us/en/reports/2012.html).

In another upcoming issue we'll explore how children use technology. I'd love to know how this applies to kids you know (your children, grandchildren, children of friends etc). This is what I'd like to know:

- The age of the kids, names optional.
- The technology and programs they have access to (eg iPhone, computer, internet, Facebook).
- What restrictions are placed on their use of technology (eg time restrictions, filtering software, types of programs)
- Comments/concerns you have about their access to technology, particularly as they get older.



## **Melb PC President's Report** April 2013

The committee has been patiently working away on a number of fronts since the AGM.

Progress has been slowed by our insistence on consulting widely with what the corporate jargon calls "stakeholders", but we've decided that's infinitely preferable to repeating some of the disasters that occurred in the past, when our strategy might best have been described as "Ready. Fire. Aim."

One of our top priorities has been our email service, which appears to be on its last legs, unfortunately, like far too much of our infrastructure.

I asked Richard Solly and James Cox to produce a full report on shifting to an external service – which would mean many more useful features and much more robust service. The committee has already had some preliminary reports and I expect the membership at large will start to hear more on the topic following the next committee meeting.

Harry Lewis has taken on the job of keeping our IHelp team very much involved in this project, so that members will be given all the information and any help they need to navigate to any new system.

At the same time our dial-up service is becoming increasingly problematic. We are still using 90s vintage hardware, and much of it has already failed. It won't be cheap to replace, and at the same time, the number of dial-up users is shrinking to an uneconomic level. We have been examining all sorts of alternatives – none of which seem particularly palatable – and we are going to have to grasp the nettle on this very soon.

The other major project that we have been working on since January, led by Lance Lloyd but with a good deal of input from Jan Wiener, Cindy Perry and Harry Lewis as well as Dianne Vogt – and a lot of intelligent responses from our newsgroup community – is our marketing report. It is also about to be unveiled.

There is virtually no area of the club's operations that Lance's team hasn't looked at, and it represents a huge amount of effort by everyone involved.

Members will be given the opportunity to comment on the report and its recommendations. I hope you will be generous in sharing your views and suggestions.

More importantly, I hope you will be prepared to volunteer to help us implement the various aspects of the report.

Increasingly the committee is finding that we simply do not have enough volunteers to do all the tasks that we have already identified, let alone tackle the new ones that the marketing report will outline.

Our very survival depends on new volunteers, so please, as you digest the report and hopefully take part in some of the discussions that it will engender, think about the ways in which you might be able to make a personal contribution to the future of Melb PC.

James Cox is pretty typical of our volunteers: despite a lot of commitments, he has been prepared to volunteer his knowledge and time in the area of our internet infrastructure. I have recommended that he be appointed to fill the committee vacancy.

I am not going to be around much over the next six weeks or so, I'm afraid, because of work commitments with the family business, Psychology Melbourne. I have taken a leave of absence from the committee, although I will be available if any critical issues arise, and I will be communicating desultorily on various matters, including PC Update. 也

## Legal & Compliance Report: Special General Meeting

On 6 March 2012, Melb PC held a special general meeting to consider motions to make Barry Martin and Sean Clarke honorary life members. Members voted to carry both motions.

The meeting also considered a motion to adopt the Model Rules as laid out in the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (the Act). A number of members spoke for and against the motion.

There was a general agreement that the Model Rules are well drafted and a good starting point for Melb PC but members expressed a desire for a longer period of consultation to consider any issues that may impact on Melb PC's operations.

Some members were concerned that the proposal to move procedural matters to Melb PC's Policies and Procedures may not be permitted under the Act. Others were concerned that even if this was permitted, they would be more comfortable if everything was in Melb PC's rules. As our current rules prevented us from adjourning the motion, the meeting voted against the Model Rules at this time.

A number of members volunteered to assist with any review of the Model Rules and were in favour of having an implementation team to ensure that we covered off all members concerns before making a final decision. I will be recommending to the Committee that we do this and at the end of the process tell the Registrar exactly what we want in our Rules and take advice from the Registrar on the final form of Melb PC's Rules.

It is good to see the level of interest and commitment from members on this important issue for the club and I will continue to report on progress in the PC Update. If anyone has any comments or questions please email me at sharman@melbpc.org.au. I will place all comments and submissions on the website along with Committee recommendations and correspondence from the Registrar.



## **Library services**

The Melb PC Library boasts a large collection of books, magazines and other resources. Now, at last, it has a proper home in the small room between the Office and the Borrett (Main Meeting) Room, having previously being housed at the rear of the Borrett Room.

By the time you read this, all library resources – books, magazines and audiovisual – should be on shelves in the library room. I want to thank Barry Carle for organising the move and Ron Furlonger who helped him move everything.

#### **Opening hours**

The library will generally be open to members for browsing, reading, returns and borrowing during Melb PC's normal opening hours of 10am-3pm, apart from the occasional meetings. I'd suggest ringing the office first if you're coming in specifically for the library. Conveners of evening SIG meetings may also open the library for the use of members attending at that time.

#### **Meetings in the library**

The management committee will continue to meet regularly in the library and other groups may also book it for meetings. If you need a venue for a meeting, for discussion or for a project working group, consider holding it in the library. However, if you need dedicated SIG or training PCs for attendees to use, the Small SIG (Training) Room may be more suitable. Book any meeting room through the office.

#### **Recommending new books**

We regularly buy new books, based mostly on requests received from members, related to the main aim of Melb PC: educating people about personal computing. So if you spot a book online or in a bookstore that you'd like to use but don't need a personal copy of, tell us! Send me the details at the email address above, including the ISBN if known. Also tell us its audience – who will get most benefit from using it? While we can't promise to buy every book you ask for, we will get everything we can that's of wide enough appeal. As a rule of thumb, if we estimate that six or more members would want to use it, we'll buy it.

#### **Borrowing books**

You can borrow up to three books at a time for up to a month each. If you want to renew the loan, please return the book first, then borrow it again at the next opportunity. Note that we may charge members the replacement cost of any book not returned within three months of borrowing.

#### Magazines

For many years we have received the magazines of every major PC user group in Australia, and some from overseas, including Apple user groups. The library also subscribes to several commercial magazines, including: *Tech Life Australia, Australian Photography* + *Digital, Which Digital Camera* and *PC and Tech Authority*. As with books, if you believe a PC-related magazine will benefit members, please recommend that we subscribe to it.

All magazines, both club and commercial, are available for reading in the library. Older ones may be borrowed.

#### **Audiovisual**

We have recently received a donation of two new music playmats. These are aimed at younger family members of Melb PC. Each playmat comes with instructions. One playmat includes a record function, to let the budding Mozart save and play back new tunes. The other focusses on DJ skills and includes a microphone and scratching turntable.

Members can borrow a playmat during normal Melb PC hours (by arrangement with our office staff) for use on our premises for an hour or two. Next time you visit the clubrooms, bring along your kids or grandkids and give them a treat!

#### Ideas, anyone?

Are there other useful items the library could stock for loan to members? For example, would you like to be able to borrow: a better digital camera for a week? A tablet PC running Android? A digital golf trainer, perhaps? A disk of freeware for special interests such as genealogy, musicmaking, video-making, scrap-booking, drawing and so on? Please share your ideas with us!



#### **Library Services SIG**

Our aim is to have the library provide the best service to members it can. At present, the library staff consists of just two volunteer members: Barry Carle and me. Barry puts in sterling effort to keep the library returns shelved correctly and our database up to date.

The Committee has recently closed the "free to good home" table as it was unsightly, used up valuable working space, and some members even used it to dump old technology of dubious value.

## **My Life with Computers**

Computers of various sorts have been a part of my life since the mid 70s (I was 12), something I'm sure my kids will laugh at in years to come, considering my youngest (who is not even two) is able to perform simple tasks on a tablet and will never know a world without internet.

My introduction to computing came via my first year high school maths teacher – he ran the computer club at school. It was a large country school but the nearest thing we had to a computer was a large desktop programmable calculator with Nixie tube display. To access a real computer we'd mark up our programs (the language was APL) in pencil on optical cards and send them off to Adelaide for processing. The following week the printed output would come back, which made for slow and frustrating progress if you made any errors, something that was not uncommon.

A year or two later another teacher brought his TRS-80 (I think) in to school and let us use it at lunchtime. I don't remember much other than the cassette drive was a shocker. It would take forever to load programs, a process that would often fail,

forcing you to start again. Not good in a limited lunch hour!

While studying maths and physics at university I picked up some basic programming skills and an interest in fiddling about with operating systems, sometimes in ways students weren't really meant to, but nothing terribly naughty. We used VAX/ VMS until it was replaced in the mid-80s with a Pyramid Unix system.

University also marks the time when I purchased my first computer – an Amstrad CPC6128. It was 1985 and I could only afford the green screen, but it did have a huge 128KB of RAM.

After uni I started working (for dollars) and discovered PCs. DOS seemed terribly clunky and limited after using Unix, but it was pretty much the only game in town for PCs. Eventually I succumbed and bought my first PC in 1991, developed a taste for poking around inside, and haven't bought a pre-assembled one since. Windows 3.0 was my first experience of a GUI on PC – the RAM was maxed out to 5MB at \$60 per MB and I paid about that for a mouse as well. Ouch! I progressed through various versions of DOS and Windows ending with Win98SE on DR-DOS. Why DR-DOS? I had developed a distaste for Microsoft as a company.

In the meantime the Internet was a growing phenomenon and in 1996 I decided it was time to join in. One of my workmates suggested using Melb PC as an ISP. I liked what was on offer (*PC Update* was a nice "extra") and joined.

The same workmate was also responsible for introducing me to Linux in 1999. Thanks Greg! I started off by dual-booting Windows and Linux, and it wasn't long before I was spending most of my time in Linux. Having used Unix at uni I felt comfortable with Linux and it was wonderful having such a huge range of command line and

GUI software tools readily and freely available. By the time WinXP came along I was well and truly a Linux user and never felt the need to install it (or its successors) on my primary system, other than in virtual machines.

My taste for fiddling about with operating systems has come in handy with the growing number of computer devices available. As the family "sys admin" I'm responsible for a veritable menagerie of hardware and operating systems – several distributions of Linux, Windows (XP, Vista and 7), Mac OS X, Android, iOS and webOS.

In my professional life I'm an air traffic controller and make extensive use of computers. As you'd expect there's the standard corporate office fare of WinXP (soon to be Win7), MS Office, Outlook, etc. At the control console we use a Unix-based ATC system (Eurocat 2000), a Linux-based emergency back-up system and a Windows-based supplementary information display system.

Controlling in the early 1990s was a very manual affair – we used a system that had a radar screen displaying basic information, and wrote on paper strips to record our control actions. It could be slow and laborious at times as you had to

annotate changes by hand and you needed to remember a lot of information.

In 1998 we transitioned to a fully computerised Eurocat 2000 system where all information is displayed on screen, details can be changed with a few clicks of the mouse and there is no more writing on paper strips. My colleagues were well pleased at no longer having to read my scribblings!

And as Microsoft warns on the box we don't

The combination of Microsoft Office on your desktop and Microsoft's array of online services makes it easy to have your head in the clouds but keep one foot safely on the ground.

Last month we looked at the pros and cons of Microsoft's new Office 365 Home Premium subscription service, which puts all the Office desktop applications on five of your computers for only \$12 per month or \$119 per year. It's worth mentioning that Microsoft has backed down on its licensing changes to single retail copies of Office 2013. Initially, if your computer died then your retail copy of Office 2013 died with it, but a major consumer backlash has seen Microsoft back-track, and it's now possible to transfer your old copy of Office 2013 to your new computer. This change makes a single \$169 retail copy of Office Home & Student 2013 more attractive for some people with basic needs.

Flexible pricing is not all that's interesting about Microsoft's latest offerings. Microsoft has also tightened up integration between the desktop Office suite, the cloud-based Office Web Apps suite, the SkyDrive cloud storage service and Windows Live Hotmail, which has been rebadged as Outlook.com (not to be confused with the Outlook desktop mail client).

Along with the 7GB of SkyDrive online

storage included with all Windows Live accounts, Microsoft offers an additional 20GB of free SkyDrive storage to Office 365 subscribers. It's also possible



to purchase an extra 20, 50 or 100GB of cloud storage.

If you want to live in the cloud but also keep your documents on your computer, Microsoft's cloud services now integrate more seamlessly than Apple's and Google's alternatives. Like these competitors, Microsoft also enables you to sync email and calendars between devices and users, as well as access them via your web browser.

SkyDrive is now desktop Office's default location for saving new files such as Word documents and Excel spreadsheets. Files stored in the cloud can be accessed from any internet-enabled computer and edited in the browser using Microsoft's Office Web Apps, which use the familiar Office interface.

It's possible to override the default setting and save Office documents on your computer rather than in the cloud, although the flexibility of SkyDrive enables you to enjoy the best of both worlds. If you install the SkyDrive desktop software on your computer, you can save im-



portant files and folders in your SkyDrive folder so they're automatically backed up to the cloud. You can also relocate key folders such as your My Pictures folder to within your SkyDrive folder, by right-clicking on the My Pictures folder and selecting Properties, Location Tab and Move.

The ability to backup entire folders, regardless of the file type, makes SkyDrive a useful option for backing up your photo library and other important files. It's important to keep an eye on your monthly broadband allowance during your first full backup. After this, only new or changed files are uploaded to SkyDrive.


Uploaded files can also be syncronised to other computers running the SkyDrive software and logged into your Microsoft account. Microsoft has also added the flexibility to sync different files to different devices, rather than all or nothing.

Early versions of Microsoft's SkyDrive and Windows Live Mesh contained a frustrating

schism, which meant that documents uploaded from your computer couldn't be edited in the cloud, while documents created in the cloud couldn't be automatically downloaded to your computer. This issue has been resolved, allowing you to create and edit Office documents on any device regardless of where they were created. So if you prefer to work with documents in Office running on your computer, SkyDrive can automatically upload them to the cloud where they're available to edit in an emergency. They're also copied to your other computers, which is handy if you tend to jump between your desktop and notebook during the day.

Alternatively, if you prefer to work in Office Web Apps in the cloud, SkyDrive can automatically download copies to your computer which are available to edit when you're offline. When you reconnect to the internet your changes are automatically copied to the cloud and your other computers.

A SkyDrive app for Apple and Android smartphones and tablets is available, but unfortunately it doesn't let you edit documents. You can open documents in other apps, but then you can't easily upload the changes to SkyDrive. A more practical alternative is to look to third-party apps such as CloudOn and Office2 which let you edit SkyDrive, Google Drive and Dropbox documents from handheld devices.

SkyDrive can also act as your online photo album, for uploading shots and sharing them with friends. You can drag and drop photos into your album via the browser on your computer, or upload them using Microsoft's free Photo Gallery desktop software. You can also upload them directly from mobile devices via the SkyDrive app.

There is an option to downsize your photos

as they're uploaded to SkyDrive, which was originally the default but is now opt-in. When you upload a photo in the browser or drag it across, you can tick a box to downsize the photo to 2048 pixels wide. Downscaling is fine for creating online albums but should be avoided if you're also relying on those files as backups for the originals on your computer.

Once your photos are in SkyDrive, it's easy to post them to Facebook or Twitter. Alternatively, you can create a public or private link to photos, or entire folders, and email the link to friends. They can flick through the photos in a shared folder and run slideshows. Unfortunately you can't create a simple link to your photo library such as skydrive.live.com/ adam, but you can create shortened URLs linking to specific photos or folders. **U**

# Data Security in the Cloud

Dropbox. Google Drive. Apple iCloud. Amazon Cloud Drive. Microsoft SkyDrive. With companies like these behind the most popular cloud storage services, you'd expect your data to be 100% secure. But is it?

Big companies are not immune to security breaches, in fact they are often the targets. And direct attacks on these companies aren't the only way your data can be compromised. Following are some of the main areas of attack.

#### 1. Data transfer to and from the cloud

Data can be captured as it is wending its way between your devices and the cloud. Reputable storage services encrypt the data while it's travel-

ling, so data compromise is unlikely to occur at this point, particularly as it's not the weakest point for hackers to target.



#### 2. Security on the cloud server

As yet there is no industry standard for how cloud data storage companies provide information about their security protocols, making it hard to do a proper comparison between the companies.

There have also been numerous security breaches at high-profile companies including Sony, Google, Hotmail, Apple and Twitter, with massive amounts of personal data being exposed. US government websites have also been hacked.

While these have not all been specific to cloud storage, it shows how skilled hackers are at getting into systems which you'd expect to be bullet-proof.

#### 3. Password hacking

Even if your data is locked down securely, both in the cloud and on your devices, the fact that there is a pathway to access your data remotely means that other people can easily access it too – all they need is your password. The main ways to get your password are:

- Dictionary attack. A targeted technique of successively trying all the words in an exhaustive list, which contains dictionary terms, variations on words (eg appending a digit), and known popular passwords (eg "123456").
- Brute force attack. This is where the hacker's progra systematically checks all possible combinations.
- **Stolen passwords**. With login details being commonly used across multiple sites, this data can be used for multiple hacking attempts.
- Social engineering. People have been conned out of their password when thinking they're talking to technical support. Hackers can also gather enough informa-

tion from social networking or security breaches elsewhere to get in via the forgotten password "security questions" route.

#### A lesson learned the hard way

Let's say you have a pretty good email password for your account with Google's Gmail. You post regularly to social networking sites like Facebook and Twitter, you make purchases from reputable online vendors such as Amazon, and backup much of your data to "the cloud".

One day, to your horror, you discover that your Google account has been deleted, rude messages sent out from your Twitter account, and your iPhone, iPad and laptop have had their data wiped.

This happened to tech writer Mat Honan (see <u>http://www.wired.com/gadgetlab/2012/08/</u> apple-amazon-mat-honan-hacking/).

The hackers gained access through an Amazon security vulnerability, which then gave them access to his AppleID, which led to his Gmail account.

Once a hacker has access to an email account, all they have to do is to request password resets, which are sent to the email address which has just been compromised. Bingo! Easy access to various accounts, which as in this case, can include remotely wiping devices.

While the triggers the hackers used to break into Mat's accounts were all cloud-based services, he was able to restore the data he had backed up in the cloud.

Most of the data that he hadn't backed up in the cloud or onto external hard drives was restored from the laptop hard drive by data retrieval experts at a cost of \$US1690. And that was only possible as he interrupted the data wipe before it was completed.

Mat now has at least four copies of his important files: locally, online and off-site.

#### **POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS?**

#### **1. Password protection**

You've heard this a million times before – use different passwords for different logins, make them long and preferably with lots of impossible-to-remember letter substitutions, particularly for your email accounts.

Or use a password manager like LastPass (https://lastpass.com),1Password (https://agilebits.com/onepassword) or KeePass (http://keepass.info) which generates and remembers passwords for you, so that you only have to remember one master password.

#### 2. Encryption

Not all storage companies automatically encrypt all the data they hold, so having your own encryption process for at least your most sensitive files would be wise, using something like PGP (<u>http://www.symantec.com/pgp</u>).

#### 3. Two-step verification

A short-lived security code is sent to a user's phone via a text message, or generated using a mobile authenticator app. Widely used by the security and banking industries, this extra security measure is increasingly being used for data storage access, or at least for logging in or linking a new device to an account.

#### 4. Backups

Don't trust your data to one, or even two physical locations. Cloud storage is useful for backups and access via different devices, but at the very least you need to continue with your standard backups to a second hard drive (whether internal or external, RAID, incremental etc), and an off-site backup (store an external hard drive at a friend's place while you store theirs).

Backup the data frequently, not just every few weeks when you are reminded by an article like this. Set up an automatic process, and don't forget photos and data on your smartphone.

#### **ARE YOU SCARED YET?**

This article is not meant to be a comprehensive coverage of cloud security issues and solutions. But with our personal data being sent through networks around the world, and not just stored in one location, we need to become more aware of how it can all go wrong.

We can't do anything about the serious security lapses of even the most highly regarded companies, but we can make it difficult for our data to get into the wrong hands, while also trying to balance between the extremes of blasé and suffering paranoia.  $\boldsymbol{\upsilon}$ 

### **SOME HIGH PROFILE SECURITY BREACHES**

#### Dropbox

In August last year a Dropbox employee's email account was broken into via a stolen password, resulting in Dropbox accounts being accessed and spam sent out. A representative said on the Dropbox blog: "Our investigation found that usernames and passwords recently stolen from other websites were used to sign in to a small number of Dropbox accounts. ... A stolen password was also used to access an employee Dropbox account containing a project document with user email addresses. We believe this improper access is what led to the spam."

Earlier in 2012 a programmer's error caused a temporary security breach that allowed any password to be used to access any user account over the space of four hours.

#### **Sony PlayStation Network**

In 2011 around 77 million online accounts were compromised, with a hacker gaining access to people's names, addresses, email address, birth dates, usernames, passwords, logins and security questions. Access may have been obtained via an email sent to a system administrator containing malicious software which allowed remote



access to their machine. The data breach cost Sony upwards of US\$171 million.

#### **Telstra**


In late 2011 Telstra's customer service website was openly accessible on the Internet. Account details including account numbers, phone numbers and credit card details of just under one million Telstra customers were potentially compromised by the breach. The Privacy Commissioner concluded that Telstra did not have adequate security measures in place to protect the personal information it held.

## Review of a very cheap scanner: Reflecta xM-Scan

#### Background

A family member in her 90s recently had to move into a retirement village and much of her furniture and belongings would not fit into the smaller unit. Among her belongings several boxes of 35mm slides were found, most going back about half a century.



Although I still have a number of slides, the important ones were scanned many years ago and now we do not have a working slide projector and no slide viewer. As a number of the slides had groups of people, it was not possible to identify them just by looking at the 35mm slides. Having those images on a 27" monitor would be much easier, so I decided to put many of these onto my large hard drive. The problem was how to do it.

Initially I thought that photographing them may work, but I do not possess a macro lens and none of my normal lenses could focus adequately close. My multifunction printer/ scanner was not capable of scanning slides. Going to Moorabbin to use the club's ancient scanner did not appeal, so I started investigating slide scanners.

#### The device specifications

These vary greatly in price, from about \$2000 to under \$40. As I was not likely to print any of these slides, or at best make 6" x 4" prints, I decided to purchase the cheapest one I found on e-Bay, which was the Reflecta xM-Scan for \$37 including postage. It has the following features:

- Scans slides and negatives.
- Has a five megapixel sensor.
- Scanning time is between one and three seconds, depending on how over- or underexposed the slide is (it corrects the exposure reasonably well).
- Native scanning resolution is 1800 dpi but can be extrapolated to 3600 dpi.
- Quality can be set to one of four settings.

• With 1800 dpi and high quality setting, the average JPG size is just under 1 MB, but going to highest quality and extrapolating the image in software, the file size can be over 9 MB with no noticeable difference on the screen. However, if you have to make a large print, the additional pixels will reduce pixelation.

#### **Other specifications**

- Scanning and ArcSoft photo editing software is supplied and is easy to install.
- A printed manual is provided.
- Only three slides can fit into the slide carrier.
- Moving from one slide to the next must be done by hand.

#### Performance

Overall, for my purposes which do not require the scanning of thousands of slides or large enlargements, its performance is quite satisfactory. Without extrapolating, the scanned images are 2560 x 1680 pixels. The quality is acceptable for this specific need.

Using such a scanner, you can make an A4 print with no visible pixilation if you allow about a 1 cm border. However, the sharpness will not be close to what is possible when scanning a 35 mm slide with a good quality, and more expensive, scanner.

I have included a scanned slide of our wedding taken 41 years ago. To us it is a very acceptable historic photo. This image is completely untouched and is straight from the scanner. The setting was 1800 dpi on the High Quality setting.

#### Conclusion

If someone wants to scan a limited number slides that will never be printed larger than postcard size, then this low cost scanner can be considered. 也



## An introduction to the LAN-slide Gaming SIG

We have all played video games at some point in our life. But somewhere out there, a group of so-called human beings exist who gather to shoot each other with ridiculously overpowered weapons, cast curse spells at each other, drive at insanely high speeds and become dictators who take over the world with a crudely trained army. This group isn't your typical evil twisted sadistic bunch (or perhaps they are!), rather a group of people who love to play video games.

#### Wait, what is a LAN-party?

LAN-parties are not a new thing, they have been around since the early PC days. Small gatherings would form to play games like Doom into the wee hours of the morning whether it be killing each other with rocket launchers, or cooperating together to find all the hidden doors and secrets.

There were lots of technologies at play here too! Whether you were using null modem cables, BNC cabling with terminators or if you could afford it, a 10BaseT hub.

Suffice to say things have changed remarkably (and become a lot more cost-effective). As PCs have become much more powerful – some even requiring liquid cooling systems not dissimilar to car radiators – so have the technology, style and realism in video games.

You will find it common to have continuous multi-day events consisting of "5 vs 5" double elimination tournaments with prizes sponsored by some of the industry's biggest hardware manufacturers, as well as some large organised video games that involve all players participating in strategic war simulations.

Even when energy is getting low, energy drinks

help get those few extra hours out for long competitions – even sponsored by the leading energy drink manufacturers!

Not only do these events provide gamers with somewhere to win prizes, but they also provide a way to meet each other, socialise and prove that we're not so introverted after all.

In many ways, the event also turns into an exhibition of custom modified computer systems full of LED lights, cooling systems, custom displays for temperature and control fan speeds, bleedingedge hardware (including multi-large 3D screens, wireless headphones, latest solid state drives, mechanical keyboards, gaming computer mice), extreme overclocking and much, much more!

Some gamers even have computer systems worth more than a brand new hatchback! You'll find that most are friendly and eager to show off what's inside.

LAN-slide Gaming SIG has brought this experience to Melb PC in the form of a 26-hour "bring your own computer" event for each school holiday period. We have run three events at Moorabbin where more than 100 gamers attended and are expecting our next event in April 2013. Our December 2012 event saw 72 participants, exceeding our initial capacity of 66.

We have a small team of IT professionals who organise the full gigabit network (with 4 gigabit backbone to each switch), three servers for DHCP, DNS and various game servers, power distribution provided by the room's three-phase sockets and hired distribution boxes, a network cord and two power sockets for each player to use.

With the club's fibre internet, gamers can download their updates quickly – ready to play games within a few minutes of setting up their computers. This easily beats out hiring a local scout hall, or even hosting an event at your own house.

## So if you come to a LAN-slide event, what can you expect?

Each player entering gets a show-bag filled with sponsored gifts (including DVDs, hats, stationery, key-rings, gaming magazines, free games with beta access to new ones). By midday, our main tournaments begin and run through until dinner with prizes usually supplied by leading gaming peripheral manufacturers (computer mice, keyboards and headphones are usually the hot items) – and while the tournaments are running (and being streamed and commentated live by professional SHOUTcasters), other games are launched for those not in tournament rounds.

After dinner, we have a dance-off and other activities as unwind time away from the computer screens.

Once everyone has settled down again, it's back for more tournaments and games, mini-expo of gamer computers until gamers look like zombies at 7am the following morning. Those who went home for a few hours' sleep return for some more strategy games until pack-up time at midday.

#### I'm not a gamer, but would really like to come and have a look at the space-age PCs and games people are playing.

We encourage spectators and the curious to come and visit at any time during the event. Gamers are usually a friendly bunch ready to explain how things work in their computer or even the event "admin" team may have some time to go through how the network infrastructure is set up. Whatever your reason is, we more than welcome anyone to have a look at the event (we might even have some giveaways left over!).

#### What does the entire event cost?

LAN-parties are generally community organised

events. No one profits from the event and almost everyone volunteers their time to run the event (this includes people administrating the servers and making sure the network remains up for the entire event).

As a Melb PC member, we are only asking \$10 to help cover the cost of table hire, power distribution and the enormous amount of electricity each event consumes. For the general public, the price is \$25 to help contribute to the use of the club's internet and venue (which is in-line with the entry cost of other similar community events). We don't include food in the price, but we do have a variety of cold drinks for sale during the event and organise a pizza run at dinner with a discounted price.

#### But I don't have a gaming computer!

The good news is many of us have spare "gaming" PCs – so feel free to ask us via our website or Facebook group if you would like to come but don't have a gaming computer.

#### Where and when is the next event?

We're planning the next event hopefully for mid-April, but the best way to know as soon as we know is to sign up on our website or join our Facebook group. You will also find the event listed on the calendar. For catering purposes, we request that people RSVP their attendance when we open registrations. The first ever Raspberry Jamboree was held on 9 March 2013 in Manchester, UK, with 365 people attending (one for every day of the age of the RasPi!) and live-cast around the world to at least 140 other participants on the web. Ideas about using the Pi in education and everything about the RasPi environment was shared among the participants (http:// raspberryjam.org.uk/blog/2013/03/14/ raspberry-jam-conference-09-03-12). YouTube videos of the event will be available soon.

Even a "million-strong" zombie army could not affect the Raspberry Pi Foundation's website when it was targeted this month by a DDoS attack (www. theregister.co.uk/2013/03/06/raspberry\_pi\_ddos).

There have been quite a few hardware innovations this month which may be of interest, including the:

- Mini Pi Out, which is a small break-out solution designed for any case that allows ribbon cable access (<u>www.codingclub.co.uk/mini\_pi\_out.php</u>).
- pIO microSD Adapter for the Raspberry Pi, now available for purchase from the ModMyPi website (<u>http://modmypi.com</u>).
- RaspberryPi camera module, soon to be released. You can see a preview in an unboxing video at <u>www.recantha.co.uk/blog/?p=2937</u>. For those people who are interested in the media centre capability of the RasPi, you will be intrigued by the new Open Elec release found at <u>http://openelec.tv/news/22-releases/</u><u>85-openelec-3-0-rc5-released</u> which fixes some issues found in the previous releases. You should be aware that the OpenELEC 3.0 final version will be released soon.

Another media centre option is the RasPlex, an open, platformindependent home entertainment system. The system is currently in Beta, and once it is able to support Plex channels,



users will be able to access Netflix, Hulu and similar on their Pi. Watch for updates at the RasPlex website (<u>http://rasplex.com</u>) to learn more.

I reported last month that a version of Minecraft is available for your RasP. Users may not realise that they can modify the world with code in-game. It's all explained here: <u>http://www.stuffaboutcode.com/p/</u> <u>minecraft.html</u>.

Another question asked was what options are there for running software that requires WinXP. If you're sticking with Windows, try compatibility mode. If that fails or you've moved on to Linux or Mac, dual booting is an option. If you have enough RAM (2GB+) try a virtual machine.

We helped Ross overcome a printer problem where a full cartridge was showing "no toner". The high price of replacement toner cartridges was also discussed, with some suggestions made for reputable shops with reasonable prices. The low capacity of "starter cartridges" was bemoaned.

### Linux & Open Source

James Cox opened the meeting and proceeded to a Question and Answer session. Significant questions included:

## Q. Email: bounced messages, spam and lost emails.

A. If seeking Internet Help about bounced messages, be sure to retain the whole message as there is a lot of information carried along with the message about what has happened to it along the way.

Lost emails may indicate spam filter problems. Some spam filter settings will cause messages deemed to be spam to be automatically deleted. Check your settings.

Email settings and processes were discussed at length.

## Q. Lost icons in Kubuntu when creating new user.

A. This has probably arisen as a result of incorrect identification of users. Note that a desktop exists

spearately for each user and for "All Users". If you delete icons in "All Users" they will be unavailable for new users.

## Q. Why is there a Desktop folder in my USB flash drive?

A. This is not normal (but probably not harmful). It's almost certainly arisen by accidentally including the folder when copying a group of files onto the USB drive. Open the USB's desktop folder and see what it looks like. If it's the same as your normal machine's desktop, that'll be the answer. **Q. Can I use Wine with Ubuntu to run old DOS software?** 

A. Maybe. Although it's probably not very likely. But try it anyway: if you're careful, you're unlikely to break anything.

James continued with a description of Linux Mint and a demonstration of some of its features, concentrating on command line capabilities (most of which are common to all Debian-based distros).

## Making Money on the Internet

#### 9 March 2013

The main presentation this month was by one of our newer members. He has only been attending our SIG since October last year. This means he has attended only three meetings prior to today. He is the first to admit he knew nothing about online marketing so he just kept on asking questions. However, he has been busy applying the knowledge gained from these three meetings. Now he has a fully-fledged classified website up and running in a niche market.

His website (www.customplated.com.au) fa-

cilitates buying, selling and "showing off" custom number plates in and from all Australian states and territories. Why Custom Plated? This is a growing market. Victoria alone has nearly four million number plates in use. The lure of a plate that says something unique about its owner is becoming stronger. As an example the heritage plate "NSW 1" is valued at nearly two million dollars.

How is it that he was able to achieve so much in such a short time? Personal health problems meant he'd had to abandon his career. Other avenues on which he embarked were unsuccessful for various reasons. This left him with no real alternative but to set up his own business on the net. Thus he was motivated.

He was also lucky in finding jimdo.com. This site provides domain names, hosting and website creation. All this is covered in the fee of \$90 per year. One telling factor in our member's decision was that Jimdo provided a shopping cart for ecommerce. It also takes payments through PayPal and from credit and debit cards. Another important feature for a beginner is that no knowledge of coding is needed. All information is entered as text from a word processor and Jimdo does the encoding into the template chosen by the customer.

Jimdo backs up daily and provides analytics but recommends its customers use Google Analytics and Google Plus.

As well as providing information, our member was seeking feedback on his efforts. Naturally, we were all very impressed by what he had achieved. Our feedback reflected this as it was in the nature of "tweaking" and covered many aspects of the website. These were not necessarily big changes but they could have big impacts on the operation and security of the business and website.

One very important point raised was to back up the website to his own hard drive. Several methods of doing this were suggested. Having one's own back up is insurance against the unlikely – but still possible – chance of the hosting company's going belly up. There is also the possibility of a dispute with the hosting company. The host definitely has the upper hand if it has total control of "your" website.

Another point not directly related to the security of the website was that it would be holding a lot of email addresses. These would be targets for the black hats. Again a number of ways were suggested to mask the addresses against the everpresent bots to protect customers from spam.

Ways of overcoming the problem of "dead" advertisements being left on the site were suggested and discussed.

Because the site features real photographs of plates and these are to be supplied by the vendors, there likely would be a need to resize, crop and alter other facets of these photographs. FastStone (<u>http://www.faststone.org</u>) is a good, free tool for such jobs.

Our member will implement some of these suggestions and be back next month.

There is to be an eCommerce Conference and Expo in Melbourne from 16-18 April. It runs for three days and costs \$945. Finally, we watched a short video promoting

ScarcitySamurai, new software from <u>http://www.noblesamurai.com</u>.

time lapse using a Canon 60D DSLR and Panasonic SD700 camcorder.

Next up, John Thompson introduced us to four new items.

The first was a new stereo microphone, iXY by Rode. It attaches to an iPhone or iPad to produce a high quality audio recorder. It sells for about \$200. Unfortunately, there is no news yet on an Android version.

The second was a 4/3 DSLR produced under the "Kodak" brand.

The third was a new compact camera from Olympus, the SH-50, which features a 24x zoom lens. John's fourth item was a "black magic" professional digital cinema camera. Made in Melbourne, this camera, designed for film-makers, can use either full size Canon or Zeiss lens or a wide range of micro 4/3 lens. It has a 2.5 sensor, and a wide dynamic range. At just over \$3000 body only, it is far cheaper than any of its competition and comes with sophisticated Davinci Resolve colour correction software.

The group then had a look at the emerging use of multirotor remote control aircraft drones in video work.

Finally, in members' videos, we enjoyed offerings from Eric McKay and Barry Horn.



# April monthly disc: the top three programs – a personal view

#### **By Lance Lloyd**

Ian Rankin has done a marvellous job on the April monthly disc, said to be the best five dollars you can spend in the month! I have already received the disc as I get a yearly subscription and it is posted out as soon as it's ready. I suggest you do the same and then you won't miss a single issue.

The following three programs jump out to me as being particularly fascinating. The information contained herein is included in the description on the monthly disc, so all credit goes to lan and the authors of this material!

WinMetro – Ver: 1.0 Final is a program which allows an introduction to Windows 8 for users of earlier versions of Windows. It offers an easy solution for old-version Windows users to try and enjoy the tilebased Metro UI before they migrate to the new system (or decide they will avoid it for just a bit longer!). By displaying useful information such as weather, calendar, news, stocks, and frequently used programs, it turns your desktop into an informative and productive work-station.

It also offers the option to boot to Metro Start Screen directly.

It has access to the most frequently used system tools and recently opened programs becomes easier and faster, saving time during working or surfing. It also enables quicker searches by exact matching in specific path searching.

Another program, **VisiPics – Ver: 1.31**, is useful if you store a lot of pictures on your computer as you probably have many duplicates. In that case, you need a quick and easy-to-use program that finds and deletes all your duplicates.

VisiPics does more than just look for identical files; it goes beyond checksums

to look for similar pictures, doing it all with a simple user interface.

First, you select the root folder or folders to find and catalogue all of your pictures. It then applies five image comparison filters in order to measure how close the pairs of images on the hard drive are.

All detected duplicates are shown side by side with pertinent information such as file name, type and size being displayed.

Auto-select mode lets you choose if you want to keep the higher resolution picture, space-saving file type, smaller file size or all of the above.

If you are insecure about what you really want to delete you can manually select and delete images.

The final program piquing my interest is **MSD Organiser Freeware – Ver: 11.5** which is a complete, powerful and easy-to-

use personal and professional information manager. It provides a calendar, a contact man-

ager, alarms, a task manager, cards, a diary; tools for listing your property and keeping your budget, for watching your health, and indexing your music – with all these modules gathered into one.

It also provides tools to communicate with contacts by phone, web, email or SMS; and allows users to send customisable emails to contacts and email lists. All the program modules can record an unlimited history. The program offers countless possibilities.

It's easy to use: windows with similar functionality and controls are designed for fast learning.

#### **ENCRYPTING FILES**

**\_\_\_\_**Q&A

Q: How do I encrypt a file that I wish to have as a backup on my USB but don't want anyone to see in the event I lose my USB?

A: There are many ways to achieve this. The simplest way is to encrypt it using the software that creates it, if that software has encrypting capability. Typical examples are Microsoft's Word and Excel. To encrypt a file in Word 2007, click on the Office button, select Save As, click on the Tools menu near the bottom left-hand side, select General Options and then you can enter the password.

Remember to use at least eight characters that contain upper and lower case letters, numbers and special characters in the password. Longer passwords containing nine or ten characters are even better. A strong and easy password to remember would be {My\$Name7}. For more security use a longer password. pressed format.) If you have the skills you could install the free command line additions to WinZip or 7-Zip, and then you



can fully automate this process and compress many files at once onto the USB.

If you have 7-Zip and wish to automate your backups, you can use a text editor to create a one-line batch file (.bat). The following is a basic example: (change relevent details to yours):

7z C:\Users\George F:\Mydocs.zip
\*.doc

7 z is the executable name of 7-Zip. Now here's an example with some optional additions:

7z u C:\Users\George F:\Mydocs.zip \*.doc? -r

This batch file will backup all the new and modified .doc and .docx files in all the subdirectories below C:\Users\George. The optional additions included here are:

• u is the update command, to replace old files in your archive with newer files.

**Both WinZip** and the free 7-Zip have good encryption capabilities. I also compress my files for storing on a USB as by compressing your data, you can fit many more files on a given USB. (Note that this does not apply to photos and music as JPG and MP3 files are already in a com-

- Adding ? after \*.doc will include both.doc and .docx files.
- After -p is the password for encrypting these files.
- Adding -r at the end of the command line will include all sub-folders.

Make a shortcut to your batch file, then by double-clicking on the shortcut, all new and modified Word documents will be updated to (in my example) the Mydocs.zip file on drive F.

If, for example, you have a thousand Word files and you have created one new file and modified three files since the last backup, then only four files will need to be processed. All this is accomplished with just one click.

All of the above methods will give almost 100% security for normal use, assuming that you have a good password.

If for some reason you need military grade encryption then you should use PGP (Pretty Good Privacy), developed by Phil Zimmermann who has won many prestigious awards for this program (which was then free). Now it belongs to Symantec (see <u>http://www.symantec.com/pgp</u>).



# ARE OPEN WI-FI HOTSPOTS SAFE?

Q: Occasionally I have seen places providing a free Wi-Fi service and you do not need a password to use their service. Can the owner monitor what I am doing?

A: Yes, they can! If they wish then they can see all that you send and receive. Such a site is okay for things like looking up timetables, finding eating places or accommodation, but not for reading any personal mail, and certainly not for any banking.

# ARE THE CAPTCHAS CASE SENSITIVE?

Q: CAPTCHAs are very hard to make out at times. Are they case sensitive?



A: Most are, but a few are not and generally there is a statement to this effect near the actual image. If you are having problems working out some of it, you can usually click to view another CAPTCHA. If that fails, almost all have an option where you can listen to it.

CAPTCHAs were designed to ensure that the response is generated by a human in order to prevent robots from either spamming sites or collecting information from these sites.

I agree with you that some are very hard to work out. In such cases, rather than spending time trying to work out the letters, I click on the new CAPTCHA button to see a new image. Sometimes I have to click several times to see one that I feel confident enough to work out easily.

Incidentally CAPTCHA stands for "Completely Automated Public Turing test to tell Computers and Humans Apart". **少**

# **1. ALIGNING OBJECTS ON A FORM**

View the form in Design view (Image 1).

Hover the mouse over the left side ruler (Image 1 circle), click and hold the left mouse button to display an object-selecting line (Image 1 arrow).

Release the left mouse button to reveal highlighted objects (Image 2).

Right click any highlighted object (Image 3 orange rectangle) then select Align -> Top (Image 3 circles).

The object (button) titled Command2 is now positioned higher and in-line with the object (button) titled Command (Image 4).

# **2. EXPORTING FROM A FORM IN ACCESS**

Open a form containing data (Image 5).

From the ribbon select External Data (Image 6).

The neatest exports are Excel or HTML (Image 7). Experimenting with the other options is educational.


