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
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

PC Update Editor's ReportOctober 2013

I'm no Luddite, but to be honest, I still use Outlook Express as my email processing tool. I was still using Win XP on my main work computer until my recent "workhorse computer" acquisition, If it ain't broke...

My upgrade to Windows 7 on the new computer has forced a change of email client, but it's one I haven't quite made. While I use Gmail's web interface extensively for searching through my email, as well as reading and writing emails from my laptop, I still prefer to have all of my email stored and organised locally on my main desktop computer, and have chosen to go with Mozilla Thunderbird.

My plan is to import all of my emails and then archive most of it so that this record of my history is not stuck in OE's legacy format.

The advice I found online was to install Thunderbird on the old machine, import all the account settings and messages, and then do a transfer across to the new machine.

I've had a quick go at it, but haven't yet managed to successfully import the 4.4 GB of messages while keeping the full directory structure. So that's on the back burner until I have more time.

In the meantime, I've been coming to grips with the Melb PC email changes, and decided to finally get my head around what POP, SMTP, IMAP et al. actually mean – requiring great concentration as my eyes usually glaze over on this topic. Here's some of what I've learned.

POP, or "Post Office Protocol"

Nothing to do with Australia Post's paper-based mail system, it is a way for the email service (e.g. Melb PC's mail server) to send email to your computer. You will have seen it identified

somewhere in your account settings as popa.melbpc.org.au.

POP is a one-way flow of email, sent as

requested by your email program when you click on send/receive (or as per the automatic send/ receive you might have set up, e.g. on start-up or every hour).

The email will then be deleted from Melb PC's mail server, unless you've ticked a box somewhere in your email settings labelled "leave messages on server." In which case it will be left there and marked as "read" so that it is not downloaded the next time your email program requests new email.

When you send a message, a copy of it is kept on your computer in your email program (usually in a "sent" folder), but it just goes straight through your outgoing mail server to its destination and no other copy is created in this process.

IMAP, or "Internet Message Access Protocol"

A similarily inscrutable acronym. Your email is stored on on the server – including your "sent" email – and accessed via your email client. Generally only the headers are downloaded, until you specify that you want the full messages (and any attachments).

The local copies of the messages, i.e. the ones on your machine, are considered to be a temporary cache files and are not permanently stored off-line unless you specifically choose to.

The IMAP protocol is ideal for those who access their email from more than one device as each email client will be synchronised in terms of what you've read, deleted, organised into folders etc. It can even be accessed simultaneously from more than one device.

So how does this relate to Melb PC's email system?

Currently Melb PC's email server uses the POP protocol. The new service will provide POP and IMAP options, so you can take your pick, depending on your needs.

Look out for a more comprehensive overview from Harry Lewis in next month's *PC Update* which

will include the advantages and disadvantages of POP, IMAP and Webmail.

Finally, you'll notice that the order of the sections in *PC Update* has changed. Now all of the club notices, calendar, meeting details etc are up the back, so you can skip to them if you want to, or else head straight into the articles and reports. **७**

Hello Katharine, I read your editorial with interest. I agree that we need to do more to attract more women to the SIG groups. Here are some of my thoughts in this regard.

It is such a pity that often men spend large amounts of money on computers but when they die, their wives have no idea how to use them. Men need to realise that computers can be a great interest for women on their own.

I think that in general, women need to see the computer as a tool and not an end in itself. I have just completed an eight week course on iPhones, tablets and smart phones at a Neighbourhood House. I am seventy-three, but some of the women in the course would have been closer to eighty. They were delighted that they were able to get simple information quickly. Recipes, gardening, how to do things, how to remove stains etc are the basic attractions which lead to further investigations.

The greatest problem to overcome is the fear of doing something wrong, particularly if it is your husband's computer!

The other problem is that those family members who are computer literate are often inclined to take over. "Just do this, this and this," and "You

don't need to know, Mum."

I wonder whether Melb PC could work with Neighbourhood Houses to promote SIG groups. Although computer courses are usually mixed, daytime courses are usually attended by women. SIG groups would provide them with an opportunity to extend their knowledge.

I have been involved with woodwork clubs for many years and although power tools have enabled women to do the same work as men, it is still largely a men's domain. A lot of the women who apply themselves seriously to producing work of a high standard are single. Others find that domestic duties limit their ability to finish work. I think the same thing applies in computer groups.

My husband and I have attended the Essendon SIG group for many years. There are not a lot of women. Some of us help with morning tea and then get together for a short chat. We rarely discuss computers!

I would be happy to attend a daytime focus group meeting.

MELB PC PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Melb PC President's ReportOctober 2013

Over the past 18 months or so, since I resumed the presidency under particularly trying circumstances, I have been concerned by the increasing demands on the committee as it has tackled the job of rebuilding Melb PC.

The committee has made slow but steady progress and we are at last beginning to see welcome change in the form of a new email system, the first stages of a new website, and a new Windows 8 SIG. I think the new SIG will prove enormously popular, and I want to record the club's appreciation for the efforts of Kathy Rouse, Craig Mattson and Jan Weiner in particular in getting it going.

There is much better communication throughout the club and new enthusiasm, but much more needs to be done.

In my previous terms as president, vicepresident and committee member, it was much easier to effect change, largely because the club was full of enthusiastic and energetic volunteers who were keen to help make things happen.

There were disagreements and complaints, of course, at times – you can't expect to have perfect unanimity in an organisation which, at the time I left the office, was at its peak membership of close to 12,500 – but there was never any shortage of willing hands and we managed to make continual progress.

The number of members is roughly a third of that these days, and the average age of membership has increased steadily, so it's scarcely surprising that there are far fewer volunteers and less energy. As a consequence, the work has fallen on too few shoulders. People are reluctant to come up with ideas, because whenever they do, they are generally left to implement them without support.

At every monthly meeting and in my private discussions with members I have appealed for

volunteers to come forward. There has been little response.

We do still have some cause for optimism. Craig Mattson's work on the new website and in many other areas indicates that if we continue to look for and support younger members, as the committee has done by backing the LAN-slide efforts and adopting cheaper membership fees for young people, we could reinvigorate the group.

But we face substantial challenges and we need some steady hands on the tiller.

We were very lucky at the last elections to be able to elect a hard-working committee, which has collectively managed to address much of the neglect which had been costing us money and threatening essential services.

Unfortunately, most, like me, have decided not to stand for re-election. This is not the result of disunity. The committee continues to work well together.

Unfortunately, some of us have pressing commitments elsewhere and every right to pursue them. I suspect, in fact, that more than one have been pretty much burnt out by the effort and need a break. They feel, quite rightly, that it is someone else's turn.

That means that at least two of the office bearers – myself and the treasurer, Stephen Tidswell – will not be candidates. The secretary and public officer, Ian Rankin, has been persuaded to postpone his retirement and if elected, will stay on to provide the group with some continuity.

But only a small minority of the general committee has indicated they are considering putting

their names forward.

I have spoken to several prominent members of the club, hoping to convince them to accept nomination. I can scarcely blame them for declining. They have already given years of effort and these days, like myself, they have other responsibilities and priorities.

That puts us in a delicate situation.

I think that the membership would be pretty much unanimous in wanting to avoid a recurrence of the mess we were in when I was asked to step in last year: an aggressive, commercially focused executive and not enough committee members with the experience and/or confidence to call them to account.

As a result, a series of questionable, costly decisions were made without preparation of a business case and contracts were let without adequate consideration or a proper bidding process.

We suffered a substantial loss of funds as the result of an ill-judged legal case and the very spirit of Melb PC was put at risk by an atmosphere of intimidation, personal abuse and allegations of financial impropriety.

Unfortunately, there is a good deal of secrecy about who is nominating and what their plans are. I am not advising members not to vote for any particular candidate – which would be difficult given that I don't know who the candidates are.

There are, however, some aspects that trouble me.

One person who has indicated that he would stand has spoken of his intention to issue a public

apology to two members of the former committee. I can't see that any apology is due, particularly in one case, where one of these people breached our financial guidelines in an attempt to make an unauthorised payment to the then partner of the former treasurer.

Suggestions like that have seriously undermined my confidence in the good judgment of that candidate, and I am hoping that before the elections, members will receive an assurance that this is not being contemplated.

Another issue that I would like members to be better informed about is a proposal for a significant contract involving the provision of internet and other services. Several members of the committee are concerned that this proposal is being advanced with very little supporting information.

There is also some doubt about the availability of volunteers to provide services that would be required under such a contract. These and other matters have raised questions about the commercial viability of the proposal.

While these concerns might eventually prove unfounded, I think that members should be given an assurance that due diligence will be conducted and that a good deal more information will be made available to members before this proposal is accepted.

I have no intention of trying to influence the vote of members – and indeed if there are insufficient candidates there will be no choice.

But I feel that I have a duty to raise some concerns, and to ask members to take an active interest. $\boldsymbol{\phi}$

My Life with Computers: Downsizing

An instance of downsizing, change of lifestyle and my electronic adaption to the situation.

I had been married for 63 years when my dear wife died. I immediately sold our large two-storey Berwick home and started looking for a suitable retirement village in the surrounding area.

Simultaneously, I commenced disposing of our massive accumulation of clothing and belongings in the house and garage, during which time several valuable items had been stolen. When selling second-hand items in new or pristine condition, you are obliged to accept prices which are only 5-10 per cent of what might be your expectations.

After the garage sale and newspaper advertising, I donated to what I think is the best and easiest-to-deal-with charity organisation, Diabetes Australia.

In Berwick I had an Optus ADSL home line package providing home line rental and 10 GB of broadband monthly. My desktop PC ran a 64-bit Windows 7 system with 5 USB hard drives totalling about 4 TB of storage, a Logitech subwoofer sound system and a Brother DCP-J125 multifunction printer.

The printer has the advantage of large capacity ink storage cartridges for each of the colours, and these were delivered when required at a very economical price by a representative from Endeavour Hills.

With help, I labelled all my components before disconnecting for removal and transport in my car.

Our two mobile phones used Amaysim, which we found to be easily the cheapest. We needed no contract, paid no monthly fee and it cost just 15 cents a minute for Australia-wide calls to both mobiles and landlines.

Amaysim uses the Optus network and in areas with good coverage, Amaysim can provide an economical wireless USB 3G and 4G mobile service for laptops, tablets and mobile phones.

I inspected about fifteen retirement villages before making my final choice. Most of them had very good, new accommodation units, and many of them would have suited my accommodation needs.

The prices ranged from \$200,000 to \$575,000, and for that you invariably just acquired leasehold of a unit.

What appealed to me most was avoiding the chores of shopping and cooking. Thus my keenest inquiries at each village concerned dining rooms. Many villages had no dining room and residents are obliged to fend for themselves just as they are in the general community. I had several complimentary meals in those that did have dining rooms. The very best one was very highly priced.

I finally chose Meadowvale on the northern side of Pakenham, which is a much more attractive village than the others. It was beautifully laid out 30 years ago on high ground overlooking the town and surrounding countryside. From parts of Meadowvale you can see the two bays.

My solid brick unit has been comprehensively modernised with top quality appointments.

I have also found out that there are several excellent organisations which will deliver good meals to your door for very reasonable prices.

Once moved in, I had help in re-establishing the same desktop PC and other equipment, and then found that I had to change my email address because I changed service provider from Optus to Telstra.

Telstra seems to cost more, so I was keen to continue with Optus, but when I enquired about broadband I found that in my part of Pakenham

Optus has less broadband coverage. So after further investigation I had to install a Telstra home line and a Telstra USB 3G and 4G wireless broadband service.

That was initially unsatisfactory because of signal dropout, until a good friend obtained an aerial extension from Dick Smith for me of about four metres on my USB connection.

Now I have a useful and economical 4 GB per month broadband, which suits my diminishing needs. The service is noticeably slower than in Berwick but then so am I. The help of a good friend to guide me through the new connections was welcome.

I still use Amaysim for my one remaining mobile phone. It is used a lot more now because a call on my Telstra house phone costs substantially more per minute, plus more depending on distance, plus a call connection fee of 45 cents per call, and more again if the call is to a non-Telstra mobile.

Overall, to me this major change in my life and lifestyle has been beneficial and successful.

The whole atmosphere at Meadowvale is relaxing. There are numerous activities and outings. There are computer and genealogy groups amongst others, as well as a library, theatre and cinema outings, trips and tours, and twice a week there are classes in aerobics and also in strength improvement.

But a note of warning, don't do what I did: in the night before my big move, I had a very heavy fall resulting in broken ribs, which caused significant pain and discomfort in the weeks following. **७**

Windows 8 – an Introduction

A report by KATHY ROUSE on the inaugural Melb PC User Group Windows 7 & 8 SIG Workshop, held on 21 September 2013.

Window's latest operating system has a significantly redesigned interface that takes a little bit of learning at first. As we became more familiar with navigating the new version of Windows at the workshop, I think that most of us quite enjoyed some of the new features and can see that this is the logical progression for our future computing needs.

Windows 8 has been designed to work on touchscreen devices, such as the new Windows Surface and other small tablet units, as well as on the traditional PC using a mouse and keyboard.

For most of the Workshop we concentrated on navigating the new operating system on our

standard laptops and desktops, using our keyboard and mouse.

At the end of our workshop, presenter Craig Mattson demonstrated some of the new portable devices with Windows 8 installed and showed us how to use hand gestures to navigate the system.

Following are just some of the areas that we covered. At the end of this report are some links to tutorials and helpful sites for getting to know more about Windows 8. Of course, if you really want to know more or, maybe you have discovered some neat tricks and tips you would like to share with other members, you should come along to our next workshop.



WINDOWS 8 - AN INTRODUCTION

Start Screen

This is the main screen that you will see, which displays all of your apps (applications) as tiles. You can also view your familiar desktop programs, such as Notepad and Word, as tiles.

You can personalise the screen by changing the colour scheme, choosing a background image, rearranging your tiles into groups and naming the groups.

Simplified Desktop

The new desktop is very similar to previous versions and can be accessed by clicking on the Desktop tile on the Start Screen, or you can use the keyboard shortcut Win+D.

Win Key

You can use this key to quickly toggle between the start screen and the latest item you had open.

Hot Corners

Lower left

When you are using an app, you can click in

the lower-left corner to switch back to the Start Screen (usually I just hit the Windows key on the keyboard).

Upper left

You can see what apps you have open and switch between them by hovering the mouse in the corner and then slowly dragging the mouse down along the left edge so that a thumbnail of each app appears. This area on the left hand side, set to auto-hide, is called the Switcher. You can go back to an app by clicking on it, or you can close it by right-clicking and selecting "close."

Upper and lower right corners

Hovering here brings up the new Charms bar where you can adjust computer settings, printers and so much more.

Charms Bar

You can access this bar at any time and you will find that it can be used to adjust many settings in the currently open app.

Missing Start Button and How to Shut Down Your Computer

The Start Button is frequently used to shut down their computer, so its absence has bewildered many new users of Windows 8. To shut down your PC, simply bring up the Charms bar, as above, click on the Settings tool, then on the Power icon at the bottom of the bar and choose to Sleep, Shut down or Restart your PC.

Closing an App

In addition to using the Switcher to close an app, if you have an app open on the screen, just move your mouse to the top of the screen and when the pointer turns into a hand, grab the app and drag it down to the bottom.

Other

As well as learning to navigate the system, we looked at some of the apps provided such as **Maps** and **Weather**. We also looked at the new **Internet Explorer 10 app** and the new **Mail** client.

Windows Explorer

Finally, we had a brief look at the revamped File Explorer (Windows Explorer) and the most noticeable change here is the new Ribbon.



Windows 8.1

The Upgrade We Had to Have

Windows 8 has had what could kindly be called some teething problems, in particular the emphasis on the touch screen experience, which seems to be at the expense of those on a desktop computer with a standard display.

The disappearance of the Start button (remember the big deal Microsoft made of it when it was first introduced?) was a misstep, particularly as the main user interface is so different from previous versions of Windows, creating some anxiety in those who searched in vain for it.

Following are a few of the issues Microsoft has addressed with the upcoming release of Windows 8.1, as well as some new features. It is not as big a leap as Windows 7 to Windows 8 was, but it is still considered more of an upgrade than a standard service pack.

Bing Search

The new Bing search enables users to search local files, settings and apps from a single centralised view.

The results will appear differently depending on what you're searching for: Wikipedia is the main source for information and photos of a person; for a place you get directions; and for musicians you get videos and music tracks which can then be played in Xbox Music.

Start Button

The Start button is back – but the Start menu isn't. The Start menu just takes you to the "All Apps" view of the start screen. At least the two different interfaces have been tweaked a little to more closely match and make the switch between them less jarring.

All Apps Start Screen

The "All Apps" view can be set to the default in the Start Screen, showing all installed programs alphabetically organised into groups.

To do this, right-click on the Taskbar and select Properties. Go to the Navigation tab and enable "Show the Apps view automatically when I go to Start" option.

Tiles

After a couple of months of using Windows 8 on my laptop, I still struggle to get the right gestures to resize and arrange my tiles. The 8.1 release simplifies this process with basic "press and hold" as well as right click options, and the addition of large and small tile options.

App View

Does anyone use the Apps? If you do, you can now use two or three apps at a time with the new "snap view."

Boot to Desktop

Avoid the Start screen all together! Great for those doing their best to make it work like Windows 7.

To do this, right-click on Taskbar and select Properties option. Go to "Navigation" tab and enable "Go to the desktop instead of Start when I sign in" option.

Internet Explorer 11

Internet Explorer 11 is a significant update.It appears in two versions under Windows 8.1, both in the Modern environment, and one on the desktop.

Lock Screen Slideshow

The Lock screen turns into a photo gallery.

SkyDrive

SkyDrive has been integrated into Windows 8.1 so that you can save files directly into it, plus there are additional storage options. All the contents

are visible, but they are downloaded on demand rather than constantly synchronising between the "cloud" and your computer. However, you can choose to make specific files available offline. **U**

JOHN SWALE reports on Questions and Answers from the opening session of the September monthly meeting as well from members' written submissions, as answered by BARRY MARTIN.



FIREFOX

I have the latest version of Firefox (version 23) and I find it has an annoying habit of blocking some files on the Internet. I can force them to open by clicking the shield. Is there an easier way?

Unfortunately no, just a work-around. When the software installs it is set up with the highest security. You can change some of the security settings if you are prepared to take the risk.

ORACLE

I get a lot of ambush marketing. It pops up an Oracle message when I go into Mozilla Thunderbird and asks if I want to give it access to the computer – which I don't. Is anyone else having trouble with this Oracle message?

Oracle is the company that produces Java. So it will be a Java associated message. As long as you keep Java up-to-date there is no need to give Oracle access to your machine.

DVD BACKUPS

I'm having trouble doing the DVD backup with the latest Windows 8 laptops as they ask for a 16 GB USB stick as a recovery drive. Is that adequate for the operating system? I have persevered with the backup and found that you can do the backup to DVD but it is hard to find.

What you are doing is making a compressed image of the drive as it was delivered to you. The image is around 12 GB so a 16 GB stick is adequate. This has always been a problem with laptops as you normally don't get a Windows disc. You have always had to make a rescue disk yourself as the vendors won't give you one if you get into trouble. I'm concerned that they want you to use a flash drive as it is magnetic and could easily be wiped. It would be better to use a set of DVDs.

RANDOM ACCESS

INTERNET EXPLORER

For the past week I have had problems with Internet Explorer. When I go to the Weather Bureau to download the temperatures for the last month, I click on the PDF and it freezes and shows a message that it is not responding. I followed the instructions to get further information. It said it could be spyware, a virus, malicious software, adware, browser addons etc. So I spent the afternoon doing a full scan and nothing was found. I am using Total Defence.

You could try Malwarebytes or Kaspersky. You need to be persistent to get rid of any malware. I had a situation recently where Kaspersky found 178 items of malware. Then I ran Malwarebytes which found 154. I ran Kaspersky again and it found another 54. You could also try another browser such as Firefox or Chrome to see if it will get the file.

[Ed: First try the basic trouble-shooting steps: restart the computer, reinstall/update your PDF reader software, try a different PDF reader. Also, right-click on the PDF to save to your computer rather than opening within the browser.]

TOM TOM

This is a follow up from last month. I am still having trouble with Tom Tom support. When I rang the support number, I was told it could be blocked in the firewall. I couldn't find anything related to Tom Tom in the Windows firewall. I run the free Avast Antivirus and Firefox browser. Could either of these be blocking the updates?

Avast is anti-virus software and does not have a firewall-like internet security products. You should check in the Windows firewall settings. In there you can add the Tom Tom application and allow it access. **७**

We advised him to go to Officeworks to have them printed instead of replacing his otherwise perfectly functioning printer. HOW MANY ANTI-VIRUS PROGRAMS ARE SUFFICIENT?

I run both Microsoft Home Basics and Malware Bytes so that should be sufficient protection?

I believe that one anti-virus program is adequate. Having two or more means that both will be checking the same email, files and web pages and the firewall etc. What this means is that computer cycles and computer memory are being wasted which results in your computer running more slowly and taking longer to start.

[Ed: To confuse things further, if two anti-virus programs are running at the same time, they may identify each other as malicious software. –KS]

If you don't trust your software to do the job then you should install something that you have confidence in.

A reputable site for evaluating these matters is: http://www.av-comparatives.org/. In April 2013 they published a comprehensive report rating the best program based on many criteria.

In May 2013 they published a report on the effect of performance on the computer, based on a number of factors including copying files,

installing programs, launching programs and some other parameters.




32- OR 64-BIT COMPUTER?

I will be replacing my trusty, but now very old, desktop computer. I believe that they can be 32- or 64-bit computers. What are the benefits of each?

Firstly, all of today's desktop computers are capable of running a 64-bit operating system as this is determined by the CPU and the mother-board. The operating system's software can be either 32- or 64-bit.

My recommendation is that you purchase the 64-bit version of Windows. It has many advantages, the main ones being:

1. You can access more memory. A 32-bit system can access at most 4 GB of RAM. Putting in more memory will be a waste of money as it will not be seen. A 64-bit system can access a vast amount of memory. As having more than 4 GB of RAM can help performance in most cases, you should go for the 64-bit version even if you only start with 4 GB. Future application may



require more memory.

Members' Videos

The theme for the September meeting was to view some of the creations done by our members and to share ideas, tips and suggestions.

Spinning Newspaper

I showed how I had created a spinning newspaper introduction to a recent slideshow that I had put together. I created a newspaper in Photoshop following some of the many tutorials on the internet, and left the headings and main news tory section empty. I then brought the newspaper in as a background to the Premiere Pro Titler and created a banner for the top of the newspaper and a heading for my main story. I saved the creation as a template in Premiere Pro so that I could use it again.

On the timeline I set some rotation, scale and position keyframes to give the spinning newspaper effect and added Bezier "ease out" and "ease in" keyframes to give the animation a more professional look.

Example of Editing and Cutting Video on YouTube

"Stand by Me/Playing for Change/Song Around the World" is an excellent example of seamlessly cutting and pasting a video with its audio, as musicians around the world add their part to the song as it travelled around the globe. http://youtu.be/Us-TVg40ExM

Charming Italian Travelogue

Ron showed us some video of his travels through Italy, showing beautiful landscapes and the Trulli

traditional limestone dwellings with their unique domed roofs. This was a lovely video and very well put together.

"Cumulus" and "Lazy Tuesday"

June brought two clips to show. One was an artistic creation using clouds as the main theme and other items of whimsy. The second was afternoon tea with luscious looking cakes interspersed with the antics of the birds in June's backyard. Both videos were excellent, artistic, and very enjoyable to watch.

Quarantine Station - Point Nepean

Geoff showed us how he created an introduction to a video depicting the waves lapping on the shores of point Nepean as it would have looked before the Quarantine Station and the same view now with the Station buildings erected.

Geoff used the Photoshop clone tool to remove the buildings and layered the results on the Premiere Pro Timeline tracks to very effectively and beautifully create a transition from the way it was to how it now appears.

Typewriter Effect for Titles

Barry demonstrated a couple of techniques to bring in three lines of text, letter by letter and line by line. One method used the four point garbage matte and keyframing; the second used the wipe transition. In both cases there were three tracks for the titles above the background layer in the Timeline.

It was, as usual, an excellent tutorial and gave us all ideas on how to produce a similar effect for our titles.

Access and Excel

Environment : Windows 7 with Access 2010 and Excel 2010

During our meeting we discussed:

- Beneficial design features for a database that will store revenue and expense
- transactions. Storing dates as numbers, having query layouts similar to Excel, queries can show subtotals from Access 07.

August 2013

Bryan Paten introduced and welcomed Bill Dair, who gave a guest presentation and answered questions.

Questions and Answers

How can I transfer VHS tapes to a DVD or USB stick?

You can pay to have it done or buy a unit that will do it, but it's not a simple process. To do it yourself, you need a video capture card in your PC and software to go with it. There's a converter at the Melb PC office, but it would take you a couple of days. Margaret offered to do it on her machine.

I am using Picasa 3, and found that all my group photos had been converted to passport size in a separate file. Why?

It's a face recognition feature of Picasa which it does automatically. It puts all the pictures of one person in a separate folder.

I'm using Gmail. Where is the folder that holds all the attachments?

Eudora provided this feature, but in Gmail you have to save the attachments yourself if you want them stored on your computer.

[ED: or download them to your computer using an email program such as Outlook or Mozilla Thunderbird, ensuring the settings are set to download the whole message (i.e. not "headers only"). – KS]

How can you stop a very large file from downloading when it has already started to download?

In Firefox you can click on the download icon (small downward pointing arrow at the top right of the screen) to stop it. Or open the Task Manager (Ctrl-Alt-Del) and cancel the process.

How can I prevent my computer from loading all the photos from my card reader?

Change the setting in one of your programs, such as Picasa, which says you want to download all.

How can I download photos from my camera twice?

After downloading, go to the File Manager, look at the photos and transfer the ones you want.
Comments: Clive had to move photos from an Android tablet to a USB stick. There should be a facility to copy and paste.

Melb PC Conveners' Meeting

Bryan attended this and learnt that a completely new website is currently being developed for Melb PC by member volunteers. A huge cost saving for us. Note: Building a web site like what Melb PC user group is going to end up with, could cost up to \$300,000 commercially.

Feedback is required from members as to what we as members can do to assist Melb PC user groups in the future. For example, Bryan would like our members to consider doing short presentations (about five minutes) at our Beast meetings.

Bill Dair started by saying there is a lot of free software around but, when you are installing it, you should be careful to untick any additional programs included with it that you don't want on your computer.

What's available?

- Melb PC Monthly Disc.
- Free subscription services such as Gizmo (http://www.techsupportalert.com/) – you sign up to get informed of new releases.
- Ninite also very good and doesn't include extra unrequested software with your download.

Must-have freeware

- Internet browsers: Firefox, Opera & Google Chrome are the main ones.
- Security: Win 8 has its own. Otherwise use
 MS Security Essentials and Malware Bytes.
- Multimedia: VLC Media Player is excellent.
- PDF writer/reader: PDF 24
- Photo view: Irfan View (especially good for reducing photos), Picasa
- Utilities: CCleaner is excellent. Revo
 Uninstaller gets rid of registry entries for
 uninstalled programs.
- File Searcher: The Everything program is better than Microsoft.
- File compression/decompression: 7-Zip.

On the Ninite home page, click on the applications you need, download the installer, and Ninite will then download and install them all. It installs them in the default folder and installs 64-bit apps on a 64-bit machine. Bill has used the program without turning off his firewall. Note that Ninite doesn't describe the programs – look at Gizmo first.

Casey by Con Lilley

September 2013

Members are getting used to the new venue at Casey Library and finding parking places. Setting up time is really short now and the first Speaker was ready to go by 12.40pm. It was Adrian Corkeron with a demonstration of online maps. After mentioning around 10 maps that are available for various parts of the world and commenting on their advantages and disadvantages, the live demonstration concentrated on Google Maps (https://maps.google.com.au).

There were slight teething troubles with the access to the web being shared with those in the library but a meaningful selection of sights were demonstrated and members were convinced that the best way to get proficient was to use the website themselves.

After acknowledging two first-time visitors to the group, dealing with announcements about future meetings and the Christmas breakup (December 13th at Foodstar Narre Warren) the second presentation was by Jan Whitaker who spoke on the general subject of cloud storage.

Jan pointed out that for some storage sites there were limitations to traffic levels per month or period and for some the data may have a limited lifespan if not touched or accessed periodically.

It was suggested that members bring documentary evidence or examples of problems and lodge their questions prior to the meeting so that suitable replies can be prepared.

Paul welcoming a first-timer who, having recently exerienced an attack by a computer hacker, decided she needed to know more about computers. Paul then handed over to George, who began his segment with an overview of the new mail system.

It is being introduced not only because the 15-year-old hardware at Burnley is becoming unreliable but also as a cost saving, as it will be using a server provided by Microsoft at no charge. Benefits include an increase in mailbox size from 10 MB to 7000 MB (7 GB). As the server most likely will be in the USA, there will be a transmission delay; however this will be so small, as to be unnoticeable. Generally, transition to the new system should give users little trouble and the Melb PC account, <username>@melbpc.org.au

will remain unchanged; however, a new password will be required.

In reply to a question relating to the change, do not confuse Outlook.com with Outlook. Outlook is part of Microsoft's Office suite; Outlook.com is a free web-based email service operated by Microsoft. It replaces Hotmail.

Q&A

A member is unable to post questions on the Melb PC web site news forum. Log-in to the forum is satisfactory but when attempts are made to post a question, a required second log-in fails with the error, "invalid username or password."

The member can click on to the members list but his own name is not included and there appears



to be no way of registering. He has no problem logging into web mail: Some discussion followed but no satisfactory conclusion was reached. [Ed: You can only read, not write posts via the web site, until you are set up with a second log-in password. See Page 41 for more information, and contact anywhere@melbpc.org.au for help.



Everything Apple

Have you ever given any thought to how many breadcrumbs of information you leave on the net or on your computer?

Geoff Wallace has and he told us a number of ways in which we can limit the trail we leave. It doesn't take too much imagination to understand that all the bits of information you leave can be put together to build a profile of you.

Geoff showed us some fraudulent emails bent upon taking your hard-earned cash, leaving nasties on your computer or gleaning information from you.

His most memorable line was "be vigilant." After all, the biggest flaw in a computing and internet security is the user.

Passwords are there to protect your information. Geoff has 400 of them and stores them in a 256 bit encrypted file which resides in the cloud and is accessible to every device he owns. "It isn't safe to write your passwords on a note stuck to the monitor or underneath the keyboard" he said.

He asked the question: "have you given your passwords to a close friend or trusted relative?" It may be very difficult for a spouse to access your computer in the event of your demise. Have you taken precautions?

Linux News Videos

The meeting started with the latest videos of Linux News, shown by Nick Vespo.

The first part was a quick comparison of some alternative mobile operating systems, including some under development, to try to find "the best." Included in the comparison were:

- Firefox OS a spin-off from the web browser.
 It can be installed on an Android Phone, but does not run Android apps. It has seamless integration with the Firefox web browser.
- Ubuntu Edge an ambitious project to develop a powerful mobile phone that runs a limited version of Ubuntu, and a full version when the phone docks with a monitor. The project was to be crowd-funded, but has fallen short of its \$32million funding target. An announcement is expected as to the project's future.
- Tizen from the Linux Foundation. No devices are yet available to run this

- operating system. Partly open source. The reviewer described the user interface as "ugly."
- Sailfish This operating system also does not have any devices running it yet. It is anticipated that it will be capable of running Android apps.

The second video was a review of Google Chromecast, showing it being un-boxed and set up. It is a \$US35 device to stream data/videos etc. from the web, for example YouTube videos.

Simple to set up and operate, it is a USB device. Not currently on sale in Australia.

Conveners' Meeting

David Hatton provided an overview of the recent Melb PC convenors' meeting, including an overall summary and a brief rundown on the new email system using Outlook.com.

The other notable item is the development of a

Melb PC Web Portal with *PC Update Online* being the first stage to be implemented.

Bits and Bytes with David Hatton

First out of the box was some comment on Gnome 3. It is a significant development, moving away from Gnome 2. Fedora 19 was used to show Gnome 3 in action. Fedora 19 has a new version of Anaconda, the Red Hat/Fedora install program, which has attracted some adverse comment from users. Hopefully it will improve as development continues.

Early versions of the Gnome 3 interface have been widely criticised, but is now settling down (as of Version 3.8). Available applications can be displayed by hitting the "super" key (marked as a Windows key on most keyboards). David showed the maximise/un-maximise procedure and a number of keyboard shortcuts for various desktop functions.

Next, Tweak Tool (https://wiki.gnome.org/

<u>GnomeTweakTool</u>) was shown. This very program is not installed by default, but provides useful facilities to modify the operation of Fedora.

The Settings menu item provides control over other items, such as privacy. It is possible to use the "classic" Gnome interface by selection from the login screen. It shows "activities" (applications) and "places" on the main screen.

Gnome 3 (and therefore the default Fedora desktop) is more configurable than before.

The last item of the evening was a brief demonstration of a Firefox OS simulator running in the Firefox browser. The simulation shows a (virtual) mobile phone screen and is enabled by an add-on to the browser. It ran with very little lag.

The Firefox OS simulator can be used to develop Firefox OS apps, which are programmed in HTML5, CSS and JavaScript.

These modest programming requirements are intended to encourage programmers to write apps for the Firefox OS.

Outside these hours, or if iHelpers are not available, please leave a message (including your membership details), which will then be transferred to Internet Help for follow up.

If the problem cannot be resolved within 15 minutes it is generally referred to Internet Help, where an appropriate iHelper will follow up the inquiry.

Email Help

For those who cannot access our web pages but can send an email, a request for help with membership details can be sent to help@melbpc.org.au. It is then logged to Internet Help where an appropriate iHelper will follow-up the inquiry.

Internet Help (iHelp)

The main iHelp system for Melb PC members is accessed from the <u>Internet Services Page</u> on the Melb PC website under the link titled "Internet Help", which goes to http://ihelp.melbpc.org.au/helpdesk/iuser/index.asp.

After entering your Membership Number and First Name, you are able to "Log a Service Request", with details of your problem.

When an appropriate iHelper is available, they will contact you at your registered phone number or email address, which should therefore be kept up-to-date at the office.

All efforts will be made to ensure someone replying to your request is familiar with the issue, however if the problem cannot be solved to your satisfaction, you may wish to refer to other Group resources as detailed below.

Anywhere, Any-time SIG (Newsgroups)

Alternatively, you can access the messages via an online web-based forum, via the Internet Services Page. See the following page for more details.

SIG Meetings

Most SIGs hold monthly meetings in locations around Melbourne. These provide the opportunity

for one-on-one discussion with knowledgeable local members. Details of SIGs can be found in *PC Update*, or from the <u>Internet Services Page</u> from the top link titled "Interest Group Pages."

SIG Workshops

Some SIGs hold monthly workshops, in locations around Melbourne. These provide the opportunity for hands-on assistance with your PC from local knowledgeable members.

Please contact the Convener at least 24 hours before attending so they can research the problem, and bring to the meeting any hardware or software that might be needed.

HOW TO GET HELP

Monthly Meeting Q&A

At the Moorabbin Monthly General Meeting, besides interaction with other members, there is always a Q&A session hosted by one of the Group's computer experts. If you have a straightforward question, this is often a good place to get a precise answer with additional feedback from the audience.

Dial Help

If your problem relates to one of the listed categories, the relevant volunteer may be telephoned for

specific advice. Calls can be made between 9am to 5pm and 6.30pm to 9pm.

Please keep all calls short, particularly during business hours, and don't expect a volunteer to call you back on a mobile phone number.

Home Visit Assist

This service is only for members who are restricted in their activities or mobility. This generally means those with an Age or Disability Pension.

NEWSGROUPS VIA ONLINE WEB-BASED FORUM

Accessing the forum is a two-step process. The first step gains read-only access using your Melb PC credentials. i.e. username and password as for email or Webmail. e.g. fdagg *******

The second step, to allow posting of messages, requires a separate forum username and password i.e. you need to join the forum. Currently the only way to do this is to post a message in one of the newsgroups (use melbpc.general) using a news client such as Thunderbird. A forum membership is then automatically generated based on the name and email address used.

e.g. Fred Dagg fdagg@melbpc.org.au

This can be done on a member's behalf by sending an email to anywhere@melbpc.org.au detailing the name and email address you wish to use. Please use your real name as we're a friendly bunch, and note that the newsgroups are private and only accessible by fellow Melb PC members. You don't have to use your Melb PC email address.

Once the forum membership has been created you will receive an auto-generated email to confirm you really do want to join. Confirm and then use the forum's "forgotten password" link to generate a new password. This is all handled between the forum software and the user nominated email account so no-one else has access to the password.

Please note that using the forum for posting newsgroup messages is still somewhat experimental, but does work quite well.



Our new email service now supports IMAP

During the past month, Microsoft has announced that outlook.com, the host for Melb PC's new email service, has added support for the IMAP protocol for managing email. It was already supporting the POP protocol and Microsoft's Exchange ActiveSync.

In the November *PC Update* we shall explain what this development means for members.

Meanwhile, the distribution of login details for our new email service is continuing. Please also watch out for email messages alerting you to the planned schedule for the final switchover from our present mail service to the new one.

Members who follow our advice and set up a new account in their mail programs to match the new service will need to take no further action as their mail will continue to flow to them; only the route that it follows to reach their Inbox will change.

The email message sent to each member gives basic advice on preparing for the new service. A guide to the steps members will need to take was published in the June *PC Update*, starting on page 16. A link to a copy of that article can be found at www.melbpc.org.au/newemail/ where you can also find links to a helpful video on the activation process, advice on setting up various email client programs, a link to the new mail servers, and a page of Frequently Asked Questions.

DialUp, the newsgroups and members' personal web pages are unaffected by the email developments. Your existing Melb PC username and password will continue to work with all the other services requiring your Melb PC login details.

Westnet/iinet ADSL service (and internet services generally)

Melb PC has for several years operated as an agent for Westnet (now taken over by iinet) in providing ADSL services. Over time we have had less and less new connections and iinet has recently terminated the agency agreement due to inadequate sales. The termination means that Melb PC will no longer receive any agency income from iinet, but ADSL services provided by iinet to Melb PC members are completely unaffected.

Melb PC does not currently recommend any particular ADSL service, although linet still provides a service that will be generally competitive.


We expect Melb PC's mobile broadband service (using the Optus network) to be enhanced with new plans and options in the near future.

Melb PC is investigating alternative arrangements for ADSL as well as other internet services and will keep members informed as opportunities are identified. The Group will be interested to receive input from members about ADSL and other internet services including the possibility of greater involvement by Melb PC in future services.


