Free Upgrades to Windows 10

As promised by Microsoft eleven months ago, the Free Upgrade to Windows 10 is due to expire on 29 July this year. So, unless any further light is shed upon the matter, we stragglers have limited time in which to arrange that update.

Past President **Dave Botherway** who is also the Beginners East “Beast” SIG Leader, sent me these somewhat revealing figures a week ago. This is how Dave presented them.

At the recent SIG meeting, we asked the 38 attendees of their Windows-10 positioning for their main PC (only one answer allowed).

Results were:

- 16 % had already converted to Win-10
- 18 % still running Win-8
- 8 % on Win-8 and testing Win-10 on another m/c
- 47 % running Win-7
- 5 % on Win-7 and testing Win-10 on another m/c
- 5 % still on XP or Vista

Of 78% still eligible for the free upgrade (ie. Win-7, Win-8)

- 41 % will convert before the deadline
- 0 % None plan to purchase W-10 after deadline
- 23 % will wait for a new Win-10 PC
- 14 % will stay with Win-7 / 8

It’s interesting to see how many are still planning to take the free upgrade. I wonder whether those figures would be reflected throughout the membership.

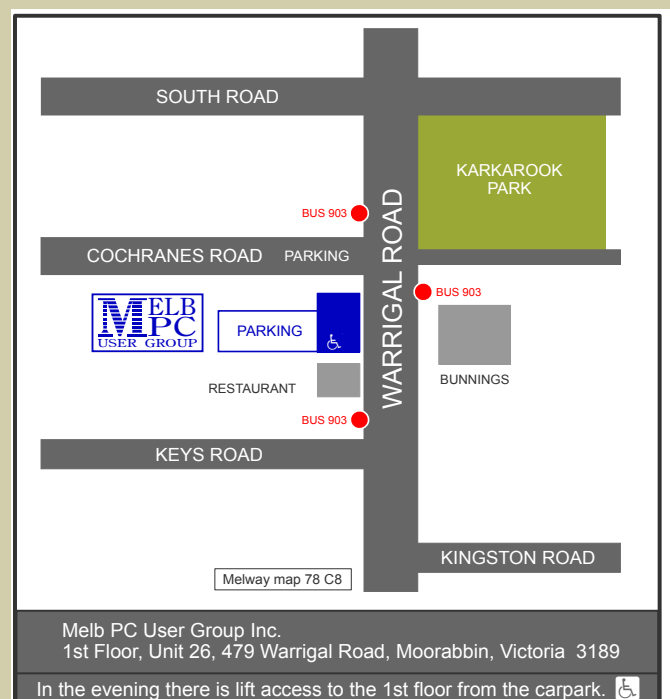

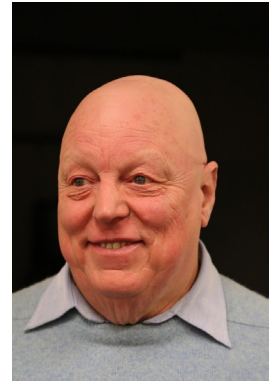

Random Access

John Swale reports on Questions and Answers from the opening session of the May monthly meeting and from members' written submissions. This session was conducted by **Dave Botherway**.



Questions and Answers

Q: On the Windows 7 start menu you used to have sub-folders where you could group like programs e.g. games. In Windows 10 you don't have them anymore. What is the best solution?

A: I also liked them in Windows 7 and I have continued that with Windows 8 and Windows 10. If you are using Classic Shell you can right-click on the Start menu and create a folder and then drag the programs into the folder. I like to have folders for groups like Disk Operations, Media, PC Tools and Internet. You can also have sub-folders. This makes it easier to find the programs. The Windows 10 start menu was designed so that you start typing the program name and it gives you a list of possible ones you are looking for. The Windows 10 July 2016 update is supposed to have a number of features that will remove the need for Classic Shell.

Q: I keep losing my Facebook password. If I get an email with a link to Facebook and I click on it, there is a request to login with my details shown as they are saved in Firefox. If I use them, there is a message saying the details are incorrect. If I type in the password, it logs in. Firefox sometimes asks if I want to save the new password which I do. However, the next day, the same thing happens. So it is not saving the password. Can you suggest how to force Firefox to save the password?

A: I would go to Firefox options and delete the password that's causing the problem. Next time the login screen is displayed you will have to key in the password, Firefox it will ask if you wish to save it.

Q: I am using Windows 7, Firefox and Kaspersky and I'm having trouble with safe money. There seems to be a problem between Firefox and

Kaspersky. I need to renew the anti-virus licence and I'm wondering if I should move away from Kaspersky.

A: The reviews in PC magazines show the paid versions stack up better than the free versions. *[Ed: If you search on "Firefox Kaspersky safe money" you will see references on the Kaspersky site showing how to ensure the Safe Money plugin is enabled—JS]*

Q: My daughter has a new HP laptop and is running Office 2015 on it. She uses Excel a lot and for no apparent reason it will freeze. The mouse moves the cursor but she cannot type anything. The only way to proceed is to reboot. Does this seem like a hardware or software problem?

A: Look in the Event Viewer and check what entries are there at a time just before the PC freezes. Also try to determine what Excel is trying to do as it freezes. For instance is it writing a file? Run Checkdisk to see if there is a hardware problem. You could run SFC (system file checker). There is an Excel diagnostic facility built into recent versions.

Q: Recently I bought a new PC and it is running a trial version of McAfee. Is there any reason for renewing it? Is Windows 10 Defender OK?

A: Reports suggest that the Windows 10 Defender is good. That is what I'm using on all my Windows 10 machines. You also have to decide how critical the data on the machine is to you.

Q: I use the free version of AVG. How would you rate it against defender?

A: In the early days I would have suggested using AVG with Windows 7 or 8. I have gone to Avast now for Windows 8 and for Windows 10 I use Defender.

A2: About four meetings ago I brought in a USB to micro-USB adapter which I had to buy overseas as I left one behind. I wanted to have it identified as it had a tiny LED light on it which would light up green. It also had a small button on the side of the USB plug which looked the same as any other one. In one application it became hot. No one was able to identify it.

Recently I mentioned this to a fellow Melb PC member and he took it and used a Nirsoft program that analyses USB sticks. I now know what it is but still do not know what the button does. This is a

portable application and can be saved on a USB stick. [Ed: This free utility is called USBDeview and has many useful functions. It can be downloaded from http://www.nirsoft.net/utils/usb_devices_view.html in 32-bit and 64-bit versions—JS].

A3: The browser add-ons called helper objects have been useful but also can be hacked and allow malicious code to be downloaded. Now the browsers like Firefox, Chrome and Edge are going to use HTML5 and no add-ons are required thus making them much safer.

Unanswered questions:

Q: I use Firefox with Norton. This has a password vault called Identity Safe. When I visit a site that requires a password, Norton automatically fills in the login details. For the last few months this has not been working. Firefox thinks it is a security risk. Has anyone else found this problem or can say if it works with Chrome or some other browser?

Q: I have used Kaspersky for the last three years and it automatically updates. My wife has it on her laptop but it will not update. Can you suggest what could be wrong? □

Apple IOS — The Good the Bad and the Hard To See

Firstly let me declare my current undying love for iPads and iPhones. However, my history with PDAs (Personal Digital Assistants) began with a HP Jordana and has gone through Psions, Palms and a variety of smart-phones from Ericsson to HTC, mostly using Symbian (last seen in the wild pre 2002). And it's very true that once you buy into an operating system you often stick with it — especially if you are spending real money on apps. So if you are into Android all power to you. In fact I have a Tab II — which managed to put me off Android until someone gives me a free Samsung Edge.

But back to iPad, I love the connectivity I get between a large screen iPhone plus, the more lap and table friendly iPad and my desktop Mac. Turn on iCloud sharing and the webpage you see on the iPhone is also on the iPad and the Desktop Mac, my Notes are updated along with contacts and appointments all over Wi-Fi and invisibly.

Yes OSX/IOS has its issues, but show me an Operating System that either has no issues or is all things to all men (women are often more forgiving!) and I can probably show you a speaker of untruths.

So first of all, a couple of accessibility tips:

Bigger text. We all need it at some point. Go to Settings, General then Accessibility (it's right at the bottom). Select large text and pick your font size. From then on all messages, email except included hypertext, contacts and calendar appointments (but not views) will be in that size.

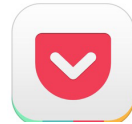
Also under accessibility is **Speak Selection**, I recommend turning this on. You then have the option to select text in most apps and have the iPhone or iPad read that text to you. Look for the speak option on selected text.

Finally, further down the page is **Assistive Touch**, turn this on for a ghostly soft home button on your screen, you can have it anywhere along the border, and at a soft touch, it will give you access to the home page, Siri, and device controls such as volume, mute, rotation etc. Truly, there is an app for everything... and many are both IOS and Android.

Apples own apps — Mail, Calendar, Reminders, Notes and iBooks — but if you are a Microsoft fan then Outlook, Word, Excel and PowerPoint have excellent IOS based apps.

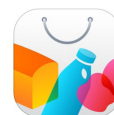

May meeting report by **Paul Addis**

There seemed to be very few people needing or wanting hands-on help this month, so the session slowly turned into social event, with folk gathered round a laptop to admire and discuss the latest Linux wonder that someone has discovered.

The evening's meeting started with **Nick Vespo's Linux News**, culled from Linux-related items on the Internet. First up there was an interview with **James Gosling** (the Java godfather) about the dispute between Oracle and Google over the use of Java. It has its roots a long way back, when Google first wanted a licence to use Java for Android. According to Gosling, Google wanted to pay very little for the licence, but Sun Microsystems (who owned Java at the time) asked for a fee that Gosling believes was 'very modest' to help pay for the development and maintenance.

Later, Oracle acquired Sun Microsystems and became much more aggressive about the licence fee. The subsequent court case was decided in Google's favour, but the decision was overturned on appeal. Oracle is now pursuing Google for compensation, said to be around \$US9.3 billion. Legal proceedings are ongoing. Watch this space...

A second, short item related to a Chinese-built modular mobile phone that enables the user to add items such as a high definition camera and higher-capability audio module. This initiative has beaten Google to market with its anticipated modular phone.

The open forum discussion related to the Raspberry Pi and Chromium OS, specifically the beta version from the "Chromium OS for Single Board Computers" project running on the Raspberry Pi2 B+. **Two problems** have been identified when running that combination:

1. The Raspberry Pi does not have a real-time clock, so early in the boot sequence Chromium OS tries to go to the Internet to find the time. If the internet connection is not active at this point and no time is returned, Chromium OS throws up its hands in horror and the date is set to 1st January 1970. This breaks connecting to sites with the https protocol, including Google Docs etc. A temporary solution is to log in to the developer mode terminal, from which the time can be set. The project developers are aware of the problem, and a fix is in the works.

2. The RPi seems to set the screen resolution based on the screen attached during its first boot. If a different screen is attached later, the resolution for that screen could be incorrect, resulting in a hard-to-solve problem. Raspberry Pi users — we have been warned!

After the social break **David Hatton** gave us a rundown on Kubuntu 16.04 (the KDE variant of the Xenial Xerus Ubuntu release). This is a long term support release (LTS), and will be with us for a while.

KDE has been split into three parts:

1. The desktop environment, referred to as KDE Plasma 5.
2. The KDE system libraries, split off from the desktop and applications.
3. The KDE applications, including application specific libraries.

The aim is to be able to run the applications in different environments, so it is possible to download applications and their required libraries without dragging in additional material that may not be needed. This should speed up and simplify the installation of individual applications.

On the screen, the default is only a single desktop - maybe a small way to help ease the transition for Windows users. Additional workspaces/virtual desktops can be added easily.

David showed the creation of an additional task bar, positioned on the left of the screen, and added some widgets to it. He then re-booted the system and logged in as a different user to demonstrate a more customised desktop.

There was a brief discussion of Snap and its increasing usefulness as a tool to add applications, currently limited by the availability of Snap-aware apps. David then installed tpad, a Snap package for a command line editor.

A comment was made that KDE Plasma 5 is a little heavy on resources, but is better than previous versions. Kubuntu looks to be a nice addition to the Ubuntu 16.04 family, and a good way for Ubuntu users to familiarise themselves with KDE.

Windows Plus SIG Notes April 2016

Windows 7

As part of the "Back To Basics" theme, there was a recap on Libraries — How to create new ones; How to add folders to Libraries.

General Windows

John still has an Office 365 problem with the SIG Contact mailing list. The difficulty was getting all the contacts into a single list. This had to be done a few Contacts at a time as highlighting all the contacts removed the option to add to a list. When using the Mail app the List did not show up in the To field when the first characters of the list name were keyed in nor when the list was completed and the Search Contacts option was clicked. This is still unresolved.

We discussed problems with *Adobe Flash* being used for attacks by malware writers. Many web sites have moved away from Flash because of these problems. Using the new HTML5 for websites provides the required animation features. The **advice from many security experts** is to remove Adobe Flash Player from Windows using Add/Remove programs and also remove the Shock-wave Player plugin from your browsers.

Windows Plus SIG

Windows Plus SIG is on a permanent once a month basis...(See details on sidebar)



This SIG will not only benefit beginners, but those familiar with computers and with windows software, to learn and share tips on using Windows operating systems. Windows Plus covers all versions of Windows with emphasis on Windows 7 and Windows 8. Windows 10 will also be discussed.

It runs to ultimately enhance your computing knowledge and experience.



John gave a presentation on using the free *Macrium Reflect* backup program. The free version is considered to be a good alternative to *Acronis True Image* for the home user. True Image is usually updated each year and certainly with each new version of the operating system. There is a charge for each major upgrade.

The presentation topics were:-

- Why do backups?
- Impact of data loss.
- Strategies — file backup, image backup, combination of file and image, disk cloning
- Image backup types — Full, Differential and Incremental (Acronis only).

This raised the question of using File History as a backup for files and led to short discussion. A full presentation will be added as a future topic.

We are planning to have this and our other presentations put onto the SIG web pages.

Windows 10

Two members have had Windows 10 installed without their approval. Other users have had similar problems with notifications of the update process appearing during presentations or gaming sessions. So the question was raised "If we are going to be forced to upgrade, why not do it now?"

Before doing the upgrade you need to check that all your hardware is compatible. See if you have any old

hardware or software that you need to keep using. Hook it all up and run the compatibility checker that is part of the Windows 10 notification. If there are problem items, check the manufacturers' websites and on-line forums to see if they will still work under Windows 10 and if updated drivers will be provided. If there are no specific drivers for a piece of hardware, do a search to find out if someone has an answer. Sometimes a Windows 8 driver may work or a generic driver may provide sufficient functionality. Alternatively, try to run the hardware on another Windows 10 machine. Most hardware manufacturers are interested in getting you to buy a new device rather than them spending time developing and maintaining drivers for old hardware. We discussed the use of GWX to prevent Windows 10 forcing the updates. Finally, If you are going to get the free upgrade, don't leave it until the last minute in case there are unexpected problems.

John explained how to download a Windows 10 ISO image to do a clean install after you have upgraded. This included an explanation of ISO files and using the *Microsoft Media Creation Tool* to make a bootable Windows 10 CD from the ISO file.

One member reported that her laptop with Window 7 switches off (goes to sleep) when not used for some time. A password has to be re-entered each time. There a number of suggestions from those present on how to fix this problem.

Bryan Paten gave us an update on activities within the Melb PC Committee.

We had a demonstration from John on how to split the screen in Windows 10. Use the Windows key + (right arrow) or Windows key + (left arrow). *[Ed: this is also a handy feature in Windows 7 (professional version)—GT]*

We had a discussion about updates for Windows 10. Some members reported updates from Microsoft regardless of a member's wishes.

There will be another major Windows 10 event in July.

We had a discussion about hard drive defragmenting. Defragmenting a fast drive may be unnecessary. **DO**

NOT attempt to defragment a Solid State Drive (SSD).

We had a discussion about encryption. We discussed the four methods of encryption and the features of each method. VeraCrypt was mentioned.

We watched an amusing video 'Uses for Paper Clips'.

After morning tea we looked at an online shopping site offering discounted items. <http://www.saveonit.com.au>
We looked at a new torrent recommended by a mem-

ber. It can handle high-speed downloads of programs and files. It has an easy-to-learn interface and useful features such as an integrated search engine. <http://www.qbittorrent.com>

One member asked about CIS files. There are web sites that can provide more information.

It is recommended that members remove the *QuickTime* player from their Windows computers. *[Ed: Apple has recommended this course of action after it was discovered there were some security holes, and in any event Windows now performs all or most of the functionality initially provided by QuickTime—GT]*

We finished the meeting with some general computer tips. These included a free Windows clean-up tool called *ccleaner*. <https://www.piriform.com/ccleaner>

The meeting closed at 11.45 am.

There was no workshop session on this day.

Apple Tips & Tricks

This article is for Apple Users in an effort to keep them abreast of some tips and tricks as well as new features. The focus here is on the iPhone/iPad **Operating System (iOS 9)**. As of this writing the current version is 9.2.1.

Sometimes an App simply does not function properly. Unless it is a system bug the problem is normally limited to just a single device. So here are three steps to follow and see if the problem is not cleared up.

1. Close open Apps periodically

- Double click the Home Button
- Push Apps to the top; normally just close all or you can just close the trouble App
- Click the Home Button once to return to the home page

2. Device Reset

- At times the iPhone/iPad may freeze or an App just does not work right
- Press and Hold the Power/Sleep button and the home button at the same time until the screen goes black.
- Power back on and check that the issue is resolved

3. Delete the App

- If closing the App and/or Device Reset did not solve the problem, delete the App and re-install from the App Store.
- Press and Hold on any App until they begin to move (dance)
- Tap on the X in the Upper Left Corner
- Click the Home Button once to return to normal mode
- Open the App Store and reinstall the App – Apps previously installed will have a Cloud Icon with a down arrow.

Screenshots

Taking a screenshot is often handy for troubleshooting or explaining an issue later on when asking for assistance.

Press and hold the Power/sleep button and the Home button simultaneously briefly and let go. Your Screen Shot will be in Photos, Albums, Screenshots (and Camera Roll). Think of Screenshots as a sub-album of Camera Roll (photos taken with your device). Then the screenshot can be sent via Text or Email to someone that can help troubleshoot the problem. Also fun to use simply as a means of capturing a beautiful scene on your device. □

Microsoft “Edge” — The New Web Browser with Windows 10

One of the apps (programs) that come free with Windows 10 is their new web browser called Edge which is supposed to replace Microsoft Internet Explorer. The icon for Edge is still a white or blue letter “e” but with a cut instead of a yellow sash. Although Microsoft claims several improvements or better web interactions with their new browser, my experience with Edge has made me decide to continue using Internet Explorer or Firefox.

In Microsoft’s enthusiasm to upgrade and provide some new cool features, it seems they once again failed in the area of making it easy for users to convert to their new version. They have moved things around, re-configured the appearance, and confused the icons and tools. I give Edge, as it exists today a grade of D-minus. I am all in favor of improvements, but I also want to be able to easily do today in the new version what I did yesterday in the old. So, as we all should do, I asked Google about the problems I was experiencing and found much help and equally discouraging comments on the internet from others. I don’t need to see videos of all the new wonderful features, I first need to see videos and learn how I can do what I have always done in the past on the new version or upgrade.

My recommendation would be to continue using your current web browser on Windows 10 until Microsoft improves Edge, which will probably take some time. Here are a few areas that were difficult for me in Edge:

FAVORITES (also known as “bookmarks” in some Internet browsers) — I am a big fan of using favorites on my web browser. I have hundreds of them. If you upgrade to Win10 on your existing computer, most likely Edge will easily import your favorites from your previous browser program, such as from Internet Explorer, and that’s fine. But if you want to import your favorites yourself (by exporting a file

from your old browser such as from another computer as I did) you will find that Edge does not accept or import favorites from an exported file. The only solution I found for this was to actually install my existing browser program on my new computer, import the favorites to it, then have Edge get the favorites from that old browser program. But if I install my old browser and I am ready to go, why should I trouble myself to convert to Edge at all?

Also be aware that Edge may already have many “favorites” already installed, so you should delete those that you do not want before you have Edge install your list. Once you have your favorites in Edge, sorted into folders, of course, I find that you cannot drag a favorite from one folder into another. You can only drag them out of the source folder into just “favorites” and then you have to go back and drag them from there into your destination folder. Another confusing change is to have two different icons for favorites — one to go to a favorite (an icon of lines) but another (star) if you want to create a new favorite or try to reorganize your favorites. In Internet Explorer you had one icon for favorites and the “organize favorites” option appeared right at the top.

MISSING HOME BUTTON — The home button is not on the tool bar by default, you must go to the “settings” and then to the “advanced settings” list to turn it on. I like having the home button to start over, they should have kept it. Of course when you do this and it appears, it is located in a different place to where it appeared in Internet Explorer.

ASK GOOGLE — Fortunately, you can “Ask Google” anything about Edge and get some answers and help. You will also find that you are not the first person to ask your question or experience your problem. Without Google’s online help, my difficulties would be, well, much more difficult. By asking Google I can find a way to do what I did before on the old version or, that it can’t be done at all. □

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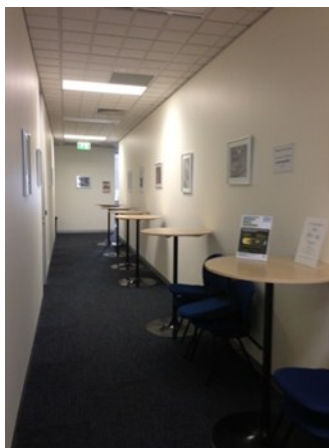
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Microsoft Office ProPlus is available to members for an annual subscription, set for the first year and payable by members in advance. (*) **Renewal for each year will reflect Microsoft's current price at the time of renewal.**

After payment members will be able to download the program suite onto their own computers using their Office 365 login details (the same as they already use for email and other cloud services). As long as the subscription is maintained, members will receive updates and upgrades to the latest version of Office.

Our existing Office 365 Enterprise service provides the 'cloud' versions of some Office applications: Word, Excel, PowerPoint and OneNote. These can be used during a login to Office 365 via the web. They do not include all of the features available on the desktop versions. Office 365 ProPlus provides the full versions of those applications, and others not available at in the cloud at all: Outlook, Publisher and Access. (Publisher and Access are not available in the Mac OS X version.) The ProPlus programs can be used when the computer is offline and not connected to the internet, as they are installed directly on the computer (or tablet/ smartphone).

One of my favorite programs, IrfanView, is 20 years old this year. I can't remember when I discovered this exceptional program but it couldn't have been too long after its release. I use it for all my imaging needs. I use it to manage all the photos on my Web page and have done so for years. I have found the batch resize/rename feature extremely useful in this area. I registered it early on when the fee was \$10. Now that is up to \$12, which is about an increase of one euro.

I have always urged those who use it to register, as at that price it is an exceptional value. When you register it you get your name and a code you can paste into the registration area and your name will be displayed as the owner. (<http://www.irfanview.com>). Both versions can also be downloaded at this site. The latest 4.41 version comes as both 32-bit and 64-bit. The program has some 58 plug-ins that are contained in a separate download. Information on what these do can be found at his Web page under Plugins. There is a wealth of other information on the program there including an FAQ and forum section.

Irfan has received over 65,000 messages of congratulations and well wishes on the program. I have e-mailed him on several occasions when experiencing an issue. He has almost always responded within 24 hours. I'm not sure whether support is available to non-registered users, but if not, all the more reason to register your copy. If this sounds like a commercial for the program, perhaps it is. When I find a program which has served me so well all these many years, I like to promote it. I have written about the features in the past but the best way to check them out is to download the product and try it. You will find it can do many of the things that more expensive imaging programs can do and I'm pretty sure it will do some things they can't. Give it a try, and if you like it, cough up the registration fee. It is one of the best bargains on the market! □

Accounts: Accounts are issued only to individuals, not company names; Melb PC may reject an application without stating a reason.

Support: Volunteers offer their help in local newsgroups and via an Internet Help team with interaction through Web Boards, e-mail and direct telephone support.

Duration: The subscription to the Network is for one year from the date of acceptance. It automatically terminates upon expiry of membership of MelbPC if that occurs earlier.

Acknowledgment: Successful applicants will include individuals whose forms are correctly filled out and whose funds have been transferred to the Melb PC Bank account.

Net Etiquette: Melb PC endorses adherence to ("Net etiquette" or "Netiquette") as deemed by the subcommittee from time to time and to prevailing International standards widely accepted as suitable behavior for using the Internet.

D. Terms of Agreement

- The subscriber asks Melb PC to provide a level of Internet access and Melb PC agrees to do so.
- This agreement starts when an authorized officer of Melb PC has executed it and Melb PC has received a cleared payment for the subscription period.
- If the subscriber renews this agreement for a further subscription period, this agreement applies to the renewed subscription period unless the parties agree otherwise in writing.
- The subscriber acknowledges that:

USB Is Changing as Technology Advances

USB-C ? USB 3.1 generation 1 and 2 ? The USB interface is changing. It is becoming more versatile, faster, smaller and easier to use. Always interested in new computer developments, I decided to check out these latest developments.

USB long ago replaced the old serial, parallel, and other computer ports. Now it is set to replace many more types of connectors and ports and add functionality.

USB 2.0 (maximum speed 480Mbps) and USB 3.0 (now called USB 3.1 gen 1) are being replaced by USB 3.1 gen 2.

USB 3.1 gen 2 doubles the data transfer speed from USB 3.1 gen 1 from 5Gbps to 10Gbps. This will cut data transfer times in half. USB 3.1 gen 2 will provide up to 100 watts of power for compatible devices. USB 2.0 provides up to 2.5 watts, which can power only small devices like cellphones and tablets. You will get faster charging speeds for all your mobile devices and laptops, and you will be

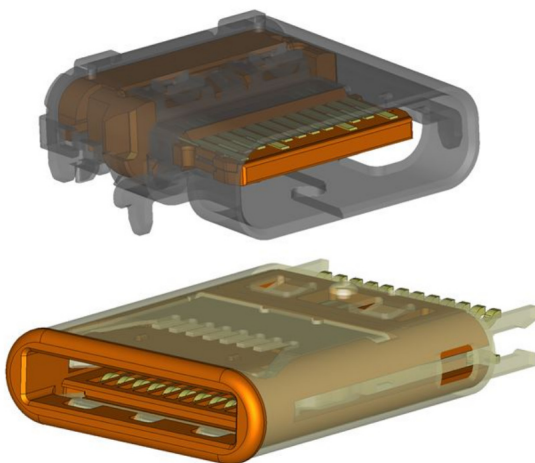
able to deliver power in either direction using a USB-C cable, which means you can use a fully powered device to recharge another device.

USB-C, more properly known as USB 3.1 Type-C, is a new, smaller industry standard cable and connector type that will be used for multiple purposes. All of your devices will use this cable type. The USB-C cable will be used for power, video, data, and audio. Your computer, laptop, mobile phone, and USB hard drive will all use one type of cable.

The USB-C connector supports and will replace DisplayPort, HDMI, power, USB, and VGA cables. This includes all the multiple USB cable types now being used. Instead you will be using USB-C cables. You will no longer have to carry AC adapters. All your devices will be charged and powered using USB-C.

USB-C connectors are not only smaller. They are the same at each end and are symmetrical in cross section so you will not be required to turn them around or rotate them to connect to a USB-C slot.

You will have to buy new cables, but think of the many types of cables you will no longer need and the huge improvement in facility and speed these new standards will provide. □
