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Cover story: Throwing darts in a dark room

Recently, we caught up at Moorabbin to use electronics to help us take more interesting photos. What are some ways you're able to speed up your reflexes to capture these images? Well you can outsource that part to some simple but high-speed electronics devices that cost no more than a lunch at a suburban cafe.

But how to photograph something lasting milliseconds?

The idea behind high speed photography is pretty simple. An interesting event happens like a balloon bursting, the electronics sense that this event has happened, and sends a trigger to the camera in time to capture the action. There are some photographic practicalities that you also need to manage, like making sure your camera is ready to capture the image. A camera is mechanically too slow, so instead you trigger an electronic flash in a dark room and have the camera shutter open and ready.

Getting a reliable trigger

When a balloon bursts, it makes a loud sound, and this is what we need to detect. We started out testing some piezo guitar pickups to see how reliably they would provide a detectable voltage on the oscilloscope.

We found that only if we physically knocked them would they provide a voltage that's enough to be reliably picked up by a microcontroller. Luckily when a bunch of project enthusiasts get together, many of them bring their project boxes which are full of project bits. One of us had a microphone circuit with which we could reliably create enough of a voltage spike, so a microcontroller board could interpret it as a balloon burst.

The right programming

The other part of the high-speed photography setup is the programming of the microcontroller, an ESP-8266. This is where we tell the unit to fire the flash once it receives the sound signal from the microphone.



Working out the electronics

Protecting against high voltages

External flashes, especially those from days gone by, can have a lot of volts on their external trigger connector. If excessive voltages get into your microcontroller board, the smoke will surely get out. So we used an opto-isolator to completely isolate the ESP-

8266 from the flash, a Canon EX580ii. An opto-isolator (aka optocoupler) contains an LED that shines light on a phototransistor. When the LED is turned on the transistor turns on. The connection is all optical, so there's no electrical connection and possibly high voltages can't get from one side to the other.

Getting the shot

Once everything was ready and "bench tested" it was time to put it all to a real live test. The idea is to work in a darkened room. When everything is ready, in the dark, you open the camera shutter (using the B or bulb setting). You then pop the balloon and hope the trigger circuit triggers the flash at a good moment. The flash is so brief (1/1000 second or less) it freezes all movement. We set the flash to very low power, which makes it very fast – 1/20,000 second!)



We think the mist in this shot is water vapour (breath), as the balloon had only just been inflated.

We had one person, call them "Lights", on the room light switch. We had one, Dart, throwing the dart, and two on two different Cameras. Oh, and one who shall remain nameless to keep up a steady supply of inflated balloons!

- 3. *Cameras* activate shutters and call to *Dart*;
- 4. *Dart* throws the dart, balloon hopefully pops and flash fires;
- 5. Cameras deactivate shutters and check results;
- 6. Lights flick lights back on.

The "firing sequence" is:

- 1. Dart takes aim and calls to Lights;
- 2. Lights flicks switch off;

Progress in The Garage

The Garage is a space downstairs at Moorabbin, with entry from the underground carpark. It has long been home to a basic workshop facility and to an impressive collection of parts scavenged from old printers, CD drives etc., that are available to members to make "stuff" from. Typical stuff is a 4 axis CNC router made by member John Shirt under the Microcontroller Workshop (SIG) banner

But in recent months some long held ambitions for the space have started to be realised. How about a fully equipped machine shop/workshop where members can do milling, lathe work, drilling and



more? The breakthrough came when the SIG was donated some machines by Rae, widow of former member Robert Last. They included a precision (watch maker's) lathe, a turret lathe and a precision milling machine. John Shirt, who is our resident tool maker deemed these machines to be too specialised for our likely kind of use and traded them for something more suitable. So we now have a general purpose lathe with digital readout, a milling/drilling machine with digital readout, and a whole bunch of cutting tools and other goodies. John got more for the original machines than the new stuff cost, so there's a nice amount of cash left over to buy future consumables. All at no cost to Melb PC!



Over the last several weeks a number of volunteers have been working away in The Garage to clear up, clean up, arrange and install the new equipment. The



machines were moved in a few weeks ago, something that took some heavy lifting gear. The moving in was done by John Shirt, Sean Clarke and Phil Lew. Stands for the heavy machines were constructed by John and Brian Davis

This is still very much a work in progress. It takes time when people can only put in a few hours a week. But



the end result should be of immense value to existing members with an ambition to work some metal. It will also help attract new, younger members who want to make things like robots, Moon Rovers or Smarty Sorting machines.

Know Your Library

Melb PC has a library of over 900 books and magazines at its premises in Moorabbin, and members are welcome to browse and/or borrow books or magazines whenever they visit the club rooms.

Books are located in groupings that reflect the broad subjects covered, and each individual book is coded for unique identification, e.g. the book "Windows 10 for Dummies" has the code OPS-101, where codes starting with OP are for operating systems & OPS-10 is for Windows 10. Any given book could be coded under more than one category, so two lists are available to help you explore.

A hard copy of the coding scheme is on display in the library, and a soft copy is located in the LIBRARY folder on the desktop of computer PC1 in the PC lounge opposite the library itself.

A complete searchable (Excel) listing of all the library books is also located in the LIBRARY folder on the desktop of PC1.

From time to time books become available as free eBook downloads. These eBooks were published in hard copy form some time ago (2012), so make your own judgment whether they would be useful to you.

As you may be aware, a new website was set up earlier in the year under the Melbourne Computer Club (MelCC) brand. This website is intended as the *outward-looking*, marketing face of Melb PC, while the "old" site remains as an *inward-looking* member services website. The Melbourne Computer Club is a name intended to project a somewhat broader range of interests than just IBM PCs and clones.

The new website is at <u>https://melcc.org.au/</u>. The webmaster is Stephen Zuluaga with myself, in my capacity as Marketing coordinator, having access to create and edit content.

Setting up and "populating" a new website is a big task. In this case we are working to keep it dynamic, with notices of upcoming events, reports on past

events, interesting "blog" entries, and more. To project an image of an evolving, dynamic club the website must also be dynamic.

Facebook

A lot of people use Facebook, and so potential new members are relatively easy to reach through Facebook. That's why we have also set up a Facebook *page* for The Melbourne Computer Club. This differs from the Melb PC Facebook *group* in two ways:

- A page on Facebook is visible to the whole world, even people who are not Facebook members. That's how come you see some organisations, typically local tradies, who use a Facebook page as their one and only online presence.
- A post on a Facebook page can be "boosted" very easily. That means with a few clicks I can arrange to have it placed in front of thousands of people, in a selected geographic area, in a certain age group, and with selected interests. This is paid "sponsorship" (sounds nicer than advertising!), but the cost is very modest.

Retargeting advertising

We use the new melcc website to publicise details of upcoming events. Hopefully people who see the Facebook promotions will click through to there. But there is more! Once someone lands on the event page at melcc a cookie is set, and they are likely to receive ongoing adverts all around the web. This is called retargeting and is a very cost-effective way of reinforcing the message and reminding someone who has shown interest in our event. The dollar cost of retargeting is modest, about 3-10 cents per "impression" to people who have already expressed interest by clicking through to our site.

Creating the campaign

There is quite a bit of work setting up a campaign because it requires a theme graphic that reflects the

event. Altogether I must create 10 versions of the same design in a variety of *exact* pixel sizes and aspect ratios, from tall and thin to wide and low. For Facebook it cannot have

much text (Facebook will reject it); for retargeting it must convey the whole message and hence include necessary text. Then of course there's the copy (text) for the website and the Facebook post.

An opportunity for SIGs

We would like to see SIGs also promoting themselves on melcc, using the whole suite of platforms we have

been practising with for main monthly meetings and some special events like the recent Open Day. This is first and foremost a mechanism for growing membership by exposing our activities to potential new members. That implies that whatever is promoted should be something attractive to nonmembers, ideally a special event. To promote your SIG you just provide the content, words and graphics, and we will do the rest.

East SIG Report – July 2018

The August meeting opened with M.C. Paul Woolard welcoming members, followed by Q&A conducted by George Skarbek. This month our knowledgable audience only had 2 questions for George.

Q: When saving Excel files 4 or 5 levels down the folder tree, Windows will often object, displaying the error message shown in the graphic below. I suspect I have exceeded the 218 character limit because without changing the file name, the same file can be saved

higher up the tree. I then have to drag the file down to the correct folder where it can be opened, saved and operated on as normal. Can you suggest anything that would avoid the need to save the file elsewhere then drag it to the desired folder?

.A: This can be done using the DOS Substitute command "subst". What this command does is to assign a drive letter to the particular folder. You substitute a folder, 4 or 5 levels down, for a drive letter. For example, you could call the virtual drive L for long. To do this select Win (Windows Key) + R, type cmd to open a DOS box and then type subst /? to view parameters. (Alternatively, open the Windows



PowerShell and type subst /?.) The parameters needed to run the Substitute command are shown in the graphic below. When you next save your Excel file you save it to drive L. You will need to run the Substitute command every time you boot your computer if you wish to use drive L.

- Q: I use an iPad and I'm being inundated with advertisements. I don't know where they're coming from but suspect it may be Google.
- A: It's unlikely to be Google but I'm not that familiar with iPads to answer you. A response from an audience member: You can now run Microsoft Edge on an iPad with Adblocker installed. You need a second browser in any case as you shouldn't rely solely on Safari the browser Apple supplies.

The next presentation was by **Bryan Paton** on "Hearing Dogs". Hearing Dogs assist people with a hearing



impairment and have the same rights in Australia as Seeing Eye Dogs for the blind. The first Hearing Dogs appeared in the USA in the 1960's. In Australia they first appeared in 1982 when the Lions Club in South Australia picked up the program. It takes 6 to 8 months to train a dog to recognise up to 9 different sounds. To date over 600 Hearing Dogs have been placed, with approximately one dog now housed every 14 days. Dogs are chosen from pounds with a good temperament being the only requirement. Hearing Dogs are easily recognised as they wear an orange vest when in public, displaying the words "Lions Hearing Dogs". Further information can be found at <u>https://hearingdogs.asn.au</u>

After the break **Stuart Bedford** spoke on "How I use my Smart Phone and what happened when it was broken". To call it a phone is really inapt, as to Stuart (and probably for most of us) it's much more. Stuart then proceeded to outline and briefly describe all the things he uses his "Smart Phone" for.

Firstly it's a phone, then a call recorder, a watch, a timer, a calendar, a radio (TuneIn), an email client, a web browser, a scanner (Scanbot), an appointment diary, a bank, a street directory (Google Maps), a location viewer (Google Street view), a traffic reporter (VicTraffic for potential roadworks), a compass, a TV (CatchUp TV), a newspaper, a YouTube viewer, a calculator, a barcode QR scanner, a free voice or video phone (WhatsApp), a camera, a video recorder, a social media client, a pedometer and last but not least, a public transport timetable.

So how did Stuart manage when his essential lifeline to the world broke? Stuart was in a dilemma. No phone to call or Google the nearest repair shop. No phone to ask about prices, whether the phone was repairable and how long it might take to repair. So it's off in the car, head for the nearest shopping centre and visit the various phone shops. Northern Suburbs Linux SIG - August Report

The Melbourne winter kept some members away from the meeting. Maybe a few had migrated North for the worst of the winter, and others may have been unwell or reluctant to leave a warm home. We look forward to their return as the weather warms up.

Linux News was back on the program after last month's intermission. The main item was a video from the movie world of a SIGGRAPH session about the co-operation between the Motion Picture Academy and the Linux Foundation aimed at increasing the quantity and quality of open source software for use in making movies.

Among the contributors were some of the most famous movie companies, such as DreamWorks and Disney. Included in the discussion were software items like Open Neural Networks and Alambie – aimed at computer graphics integration.

The second item concerned Chromebooks and Chromeboxes (CBs). A new-ish program - Crostini checks and lists the CBs hardware and indicates if they are Chrome compatible. The list includes existing hardware items and those expected to be released in the near future. Certainly worth checking out because of the popularity of Chrome devices, particularly for education.

Recent CBs can run Chrome applications, Android apps, and Linux applications via Crostini inside a container. The container approach prevents damage to the overall system by a rogue application, and Crostini does allow access to files outside the container. The Open Forum did not attract any questions; maybe all those present at the meeting are/were selfsufficient. There were a couple of discussion points, including ...

- Skype no longer supports Linux perhaps not too surprising since Microsoft now owns Skype.
- Dropbox has an intermittent problem that users cannot always see files across machines. It was noted that Google Docs does not suffer from the same problem.

The main session of the evening was again presented by David Hatton – the topic was the Gnome Layout Manager.

Gnome has matured considerably over the past few years, and has attracted a large number of extensions. A GitHub contributor has developed a script which he has called Gnome Layout Manager – a script that automates many routines that users can run to make their desktops look like the just superseded Unity, Windows 10 or MacOS.

The developer warns that the program is only in Alpha status, but it seems stable, and users of Linux distributions such as Ubuntu and Fedora that have a Gnome desktop installed by default could find it useful. Its major usefulness is probably to help people coming to Linux Gnome from other environments to feel more comfortable with a fairly familiar graphical user interface.

The demonstration was set up on a Kubuntu 18.04 installation – the latest Long-Term Support version - with the Gnome desktop also installed. A minor downside of the demonstration arrangement is that the user sees both Gnome and KDE applications shown in the menus - most users would stay with the default Gnome desktop. and hence avoid this effect.

The Gnome Layout Manager needs some additional programs, such as Xenity and Wget, and the script (layoutmanager.sh) checks to ensure that they are installed before proceeding. This requires an internet connection.

The script allows the user to choose which graphical interface should be used, and David first chose Unity, with the result that the applications menu was re-

arranged compared to the standard Gnome version. Later he showed the Windows 10 version and then the MacOS version - see screenshots below.

The layouts etc. were not identical to the target versions, due in part to limitations imposed by Gnome. A full MacOS-style dock can be emulated by adding the Docky program to the interface.

Although the script is labelled as "alpha" status by the developer, it does seem stable and allows users coming Windows or MacOS to feel reasonably comfortable with using Linux and Gnome by lessening the transition shock.
